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CYCLONE JIM IS NOT A BIT SORE

SAYS HE MADE THE OPPOSITION SPEND \$200,000—TELLS CONGRESS IT SHOULD HAVE TO PUNCH A CLOCK

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—Wearing his whisk broom beard at half mast, Cyclone Jim Davis of Texas was back here today with other lame ducks of the Sixty-fourth congress.

But Cyclone was back with a difference. Congress is all wrong, and he wants it fixed. His whiskers waved and the tails of his purple Prince Albert flapped belligerently as he yelled down at the reporter from the top of his fagpole form:

"This gang needs a time clock. Here the honorable, the representative of the people, have spent a whole day and lots of money yelling 'present' and feeling absent."

"What's the good of running a 1916 congress on a 1316 basis? These birds ought to pass an eight-hour law for themselves and punch a time clock to prove they actually work that long. I've got to go home in March, and maybe you think I'm sore, but I'm not. The boys of booze and boodle beat me true enough, but I cost them a cool \$200,000, and I ain't sore a bit. I'll fight them some more at \$200,000 a round. I'm not done, just delayed."

"And when I come back I'd like to see the rubber tired, ball bearing, non skid sort of congress we ought to have."

RAILROADS WILL ASK INCREASES

MICHIGAN'S LEGISLATURE WILL FACE OLD RAILROAD PROBLEM IN JANUARY, BESIDES MANY OTHER BIG TASKS.

LANSING, Mich., Dec. 8.—Michigan's legislature, heavily Republican, convenes in January to face the task of making effective the new prohibition amendment.

Among other things, the 1917 lawmakers will be asked to pass a tonnage tax law, an anti-injunction act, and a real estate brokers' license law; to adopt the budget system of appropriating public moneys, and to deal with a measure put forward by Michigan railroads to increase intrastate passenger rates from two cents mile to two and one-half or three cents.

Efforts of the railroads to get permission to boost passenger fares will be a renewal of the fight that went against them in the last legislature. At that time, their proposal was turned down by a bare margin of half a dozen votes.

After years of agitation, adoption of the budget system in the state's finances seems assured. Gov. Elmer S. Loomis is pledged to the reform, and it was endorsed in the platforms of both major parties.

GERMAN PAPERS TALK OF PEACE

ON GERARD'S SAILING FOR GERMANY THEY PRINT LONG DISCUSSIONS OF WORLD SITUATION AS REGARDS PEACE.

BERLIN (Via Sayville), Dec. 8. German newspapers, commenting today on the sailing of Ambassador Gerard for Germany, discuss probable peace offerings the United States ambassador is reported to bring with him. Practically all newspapers printed long discussions of the present world political situation, pointing out that England's "war plight," the recent developments in Rumania, and the ministerial crisis in England were followed by peace moves in America.

The Vossische Zeitung, a semi-official publication, declares the United States is not likely to attempt to act as an arbitrator should peace be proposed, but could transmit peace propositions.

The fact that Japan is a member of the allied powers warring on the Teuton nations is held up by the Vossische Zeitung as proof that the United States will not get its fingers into peace proposals.

This paper states that "in America everybody is conscious of a clash between the United States and Japan about the Pacific is only a question of time."
