United States Judge William C. Hook, in Kansas City, declared the Adamson law, passed at the last session of congress for the benefit of the railroad brotherhoods, to be unconstitutional in a test case. He granted the injunction asked for by the receivers of the Missouri, Oklahoma & Gulf railroad. The case will be hurried on to the supreme court of the United States.

Figures Show Oregon Has A Tuberculosis Problem

(Herald Special Service)

PORTLAND, Dec. 8.—That Oregon has a tubercular problem is suggested in the survey of four counties that has just been completed by the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis. The Oregon association, which is a unit of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, will make a survey and report upon the conditions in respect to tuberculosis in every county of Oregon.

The first figures cover the survey of Clatsop, Josephine, Lane and Jackson counties. The information is so comprehensive, accurate and searching that Dr. David N. Roberg, secretary of the state board of health, wrote to the Oregon Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis:

"These figures and information relative to the counties of Oregon as you will assemble it, will be made a part of the records of the Oregon state board of health, and will be included in our annual report. No service has ever been of greater value to the health of the people of Oregon than this, which is only one of many activities which I know your organization to have engaged in for the destruction of tuberculosis in this great state. From tables scientifically computed by the Russell Sage Foundation, it has been determined that tuberculosis should comprise 12 per cent of all activities of a state board of health."

County health officers will also use the information. One of the appalling revelations of the report is the number of children that are exposed to infection in homes where older individuals have contracted the disease. The report reads as follows:

Clatsop county—248 cases since 1913 (without Dr. Kinney's list); 113 living cases; 74 living cases originated in county; 37 of these are wage earners; 33 are male heads of families; 47 need hospital care; 32 need sanatoria care; 165 children under 16 years of age are exposed to infection; patients found in cannery, meat market, school (both pupils and teachers), dairies, restaurants, etc.; 18 had been in county less than one year; 13 in state less than one year.

Lane county—252 cases since 1913; 126 living cases; 107 of the living cases originated in county; 27 are wage earners; 45 are male heads of families; there are 25 cases in homes where deaths have taken place; 49 need hospital care; 26 need sanatoria care; 101 could be cared for at home by visiting nurse; 41 were housewives; 26 school children; 1 chef; 1 hotel keeper; 5 clerks; 8 in dairies, etc.

Jackson county—175 cases since 1913; 20 cases are temporarily out of state; 24 are arrested cases; 22 other living cases; 17 of these 22 originated in the county; 17 need hospital care; 7 male heads of families with disease; 24 children under 16 years of age exposed to infection; 39 suspicious cases in homes with living cases; occupations, farmers, housewives, teachers, carpenter, pupils, dressmaker, dairymen.

Germans Hold 45,000 Miles

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 8.—Germany now holds 45,000 square miles of Rumanian territory—and double that amount in northern France—according to estimates made today by the Voelische Zeitung. The same German newspaper estimates that during the past five days the German army in Rumania has captured 20,724 Rumanian soldiers.

Entente Losses Are \$15,000,000

BERLIN (via aville wireless), Dec. 8.—The official press bureau draws "curious conclusions" today from statistics issued by the Copenhagen Association for Research about social consequences of the war. These figures show entente losses as 15,100,000. Of these England lost 1,200,000; Russia, 8,500,000; France, 3,700,000; Italy, 800,000; Serbia, 450,000; Belgium, 250,000; Rumania, 200,000.

Norwegian Losses Reach Millions

CHRISTIANA, Dec. 8.—Since the start of the European war, 183 Norwegian steam vessels, of a total of 281,628 tons, have been sunk, with sixty sailing vessels whose tonnage totals 43,787. The insurance on these vessels, it was announced today, reached \$49,000,000.
