WILEY DECLARES PEOPLE MUST ACT

"MAN WHO PURIFIED THE AMERICAN TABLE" HAS PLAN FOR FIGHTING SPECULATORS IN FOOD SUPPLIES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11.—Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, "The man who purified the American table," came out today with a plan to save it from the clutches of the food speculator. He wants municipal and state control of all food supplies.

"The people must take this thing into their own hands," Dr. Wiley declared to the United Press. "Federal control has failed so far to answer the purpose. Food supply is too vital a matter to be branded about by unscrupulous food speculators and laxity of federal administration."

"The total disregard by food dealers of the existing cold storage and other federal food laws and the criminal laxity in administering these laws, indicates the people must look to other measures for their protection."

Decrying the widespread misrepresentation of cold storage for fresh eggs in open market, Dr. Wiley exclaimed:

"Why, I, myself, could run this thing down. Where are the federal food inspectors? And where the 'them higher' who are supposed to administer these laws for the people's protection?"

CATTLEMEN ARE RAISING SHEEP

DISTRICT FORESTER SAYS PERMITTEES ON NATIONAL FORESTS ARE RUNNING SMALL BANDS OF SHEEP

PORTLAND, Dec. 11.—District Forester George M. Cecil of this city, says that a large number of cattle permittees who are using the national forest ranges of Oregon and Washington are now grazing on their ranches small bands of from 20 to 300 or 400 sheep, which are considered valuable for furnishing mutton, cleaning up weeds and adding to the income of the ranch.

This is quite a concession for the cattlemen to make, according to Mr. Cecil, but it is interesting in that it indicates the coming of a more diversified system of management on the interior ranches, as well as being a factor in keeping up the supply of sheep already considerably decreased by the homesteading of much of the public range.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls, Oregon, up to and including Monday, January 8th, 1917, at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., for the purchase of City of Klamath Falls improvement bonds, aggregating in amount eleven thousand four hundred and fourteen and 54/100 (\$11,414.54) dollars. These bonds are authorized by ordinance No. 399 of said city, and will mature in ten years from date of issue; and are offered in numerical order at the option of the city at any semi-annual coupon period, at or after one year from date of issue.

These bonds are authorized to provide funds for payment of the cost of grading and improving of Eleventh street from main street to Upland street, exclusive of United States government irrigation canal right of way, and Upland street from its intersection with Eleventh street to Prospect street, including intersections.

These bonds will be sold to the highest and best bidder for cash for not less than par value and accrued interest; and will bear interest not to exceed six per cent (6 per cent).

Each proposal to purchase must be accompanied by a check for 5 per cent of the amount of bid, certified by some responsible bank, payable to the city of Klamath Falls.

Proposals must be sealed and endorsed "Proposal to Purchase Improvement Bonds."

The common council reserves the right to reject any and all bids and proposals.
