EXCHANGE BULLS ON FOREST RANGE

VARIOUS STOCK ASSOCIATIONS RUNNING CATTLE ON NATIONAL FORESTS EXCHANGE SIRES EVERY TWO YEARS

PORTLAND, Dec. 18.—Acting District Forester T. P. MacKenzie, Portland, Oregon, says that great progress is being made in the economical handling of stock on the national forest ranges. More than three score stock associations are organized in Oregon and Washington to co-operate with the forest service. They also co-operate with one another. A unique instance of this is seen in plans devised to prolong the serviceable period of bulls on the range.

Many associations purchase all bulls for use on the national forest range occupied by the cattle of their members in order to insure that only high grade animals will be turned out. Because of the ill effects of inbreeding, usually the serviceable period of a bull on the range is two years. To prolong this period to at least ten years, one association plans to exchange bulls with another at the end of each two years. The forest service is encouraging these plans, for it means the production of only high grade and valuable stock on the national forest ranges.

Lyceum Entertainers for Tonight



THE ORIOLES COMPANY.

The Orioles, a trio of young women, will appear tonight only at Houston's opera house in the third of the season's numbers. Each member of the trio is advertised as a musician of education and ability; the company presents a varied program of music. It consists of singing, and whistling, and of readings and interpretations.

The lyceum this year is being put on by J. V. Houston, proprietor of Houston's opera house, as an experiment. For several seasons lyceum courses were arranged by a local association, but the venture did not pay. Manager Houston was bold enough to attempt it himself, to see if the public of Klamath Falls was sufficiently interested in the high class character of entertainment provided by lyceums to make them profitable.

The lyceum means a big thing to every community, and the bigger the community in intellect, in community ambition, in boosting characteristics and interest in community welfare, the

bigger will be the lyceum. Ross Crane says:

"It calls for men with a vision and a message, whether lecturer, entertainer or musician. It must have more than excellence. It must have that which appeals to the highest and noblest in humanity. It must have great art and great heart. If it provides no inspiration for the audience it fails. If it lifts up no lofty idea it fails. It may have art—it must have consummate art—but if it does not push out the skyline of vision for the audience and touch the divine in the human—it is not a lyceum product."

Again, it calls for people with a vision for the betterment of human kind, to demand just the things for their community which the lyceum provides, and the character of the supply will be in proportion to the demand of the people. Remember, it is your demands which the lyceum undertakes to supply. What will you have?

Latin Ships Through Canal

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 18.—Forty-two vessels of Latin-American registry passed through the Panama canal during the fiscal year 1914-15, according to figures of the Panama canal record, available today. Of these four were Peruvian, three Honduran, one Nicaraguan, thirty-three Chilean and one Panamanian. These figures do not mean that each vessel enumerated was a different one.
