AMERICA MUST PREPARE NOW

MANY CONGRESSMEN WARN THAT THIS IS TIME FOR UNITED STATES TO PUSH HER PREPAREDNESS PLANS

By J. P. YODER (United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 20.—America must push her preparedness plans now, lest peace come and find her still with pending international difficulties or with militarism still uncrushed abroad, many congressmen warned today.

The warning was called forth by a series of stories carried by the United Press, telling how New York is literally rolling and rollicking in wealth, and with the entire country playing its part without any apparent thought of the future. Those senators and representatives frankly admit that behind these warnings lie thoughts of still unsettled submarine differences with Germany and possible differences that may arise with Japan in connection with the immigration bill which recently passed the senate.

They were emphatic in declaring against "alarmist" warnings, but insisted it was not safe for the United States to be satisfied with financial fatness, with no sinews behind the fat. Senator Hughes of New Jersey came out for a great army of professional soldiers backed by a trained, equipped volunteer army.

"Some that I have to say has been said before, but all will bear repetition," he declared. "The United Press articles by Mr. Mellett are most timely. It seems to me that the people of the United States are now convinced that the recent events which have occurred in the world are of such character that nations are likely to go to war on slight pretense or for no reason at all.

"A great many believe that we have lived for years in a fool's paradise, when we believed that nations could not be gotten to go to war. No man would have been rash enough to predict the situation which now exists in Europe could easily have taken place, but here it is. It has a redex upon the people of the United States, and they are crying out in their blind way for an army with which to defend them."

The senator's proposals for an army of 250,000 men at least, serving two years with the colors and four years in the reserve; 125,000 men would go back to civil life annually, giving 1,250,000 trained men in ten years.
