MANY SHOES NEEDED FOR THE ALLIED SOLDIERS

LONDON, Dec. 20.—Kicking the Germans back across their own borders is requiring an enormous amount of boot leather. As England is supplying the greater portion of all the boots worn by the allied soldiers, the shoe factories throughout England are swamped with work today.

For the winter the British government will require 8,000,000 feet of upper leather for Cossack boots and 7,000,000 feet of leather for the British soldiers' footwear. The shipments of such tremendous orders must be completed by the time cold weather sets in and has forced the government to take up every piece of leather on the market.

ALASKAN WILDS COVERED IN AUTO

STRENUOUS TRIP MADE BY DODGE BROTHERS' CAR BY GROVER FRAMES.

Fighting almost every known condition of topography, wide stretches of half frozen swamps, boulder strewn slopes of wild Alaskan valleys, then between broad up canyon walls where broken ice masses accumulate year after year without melting, climbing such rocky steep grades that it seemed as though no motor car could possibly last through the ordeal, this intrepid northern driver sold his Dodge Brothers' touring car over this terrific route in what was considered the phenomenally short time of 46 hours and 30 minutes.

About two years ago Miss Lemon swore to a complaint against Willie Jones, charging a similar offense, but Jones was acquitted after a rather long trial.
