SINNOTT TO GIVE FEW FREE SEEDS

HAS LIMITED AMOUNT OF ALFALFA, FIELD PEAS, MILLET, SUDAN GRASS AND WHITE CLOVER SEEDS TO GIVE

Congressman N. J. Sinnott has received notice from the department of agriculture that he has been allowed a limited number of packages of alfalfa, field pea, millet, Sudan grass and white clover seed.

Because of the very limited supply on hand this year the rule has been made that only one package of seeds can be sent to a person. Those wishing a package of the seeds should write to Congressman Sinnott for the same at once, before the supply is exhausted. The seed will be mailed directly from the department's warehouse, and will be accompanied by a circular giving full instruction for culture of the crop. The department has also decided that no seed will be sent out later than March 1st.

There has been great difficulty in securing some of the seeds this year, and for that reason only the following number of packages could be allotted to the Second District of Oregon.

Seventy 4-pound packages Kansas crown alfalfa seed.

Two hundred 4-pound packages of improved variety field pea.

Fifty 4-pound packages of Kursk millet seed.

One hundred 1-pound packages of Sudan grass seed.

Forty 2-pound packages of white clover seed.

Requests will be transmitted to the department by Congressman Sinnott in the order in which they are received. It will be a case of "first come first served" as long as the supply lasts.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Dec. 27.—The movies are producing good elementary school spellers here today. The pupils at Grandview Heights school who spell correctly every word of twenty lessons receive a certificate which entitles them to admission to a special movie show in the school auditorium. And the kiddies are making good. Two hundred and fifty of the 289 eligibles won admission to a recent show.

The school faculty has become so enthusiastic over the benefits obtained in spelling via the motion picture route they are planning to extend the show tickets to other studies. But the movie is not the only innovation that has been in vogue at the Grandview school. Second graders often bring their pet dogs and cats to the school room and are permitted to play with them during the regular play hour.

These tots also think it is lots of fun to get their spelling lessons by telegraph in Morse code. The teacher clicks off the dots and dashes with her ruler, and the pupils "pick up" the words.

Ratification of Treaty Sought

BUENOS AIRES, Dec. 1.—(By mail)—Although Foreign Minister Bocu of Argentina has spoken somewhat slightly of the "A-B-C" treaty, the Argentine administration is trying today to get congress to ratify the compact.

The fact that the agreement never had been ratified in this country came as a big surprise to the overwhelming majority of Argentine recently. A few men in important positions knew it had never received congressional approval, but the popular idea was that it was an accomplished fact.

The public was undecieved early in November, while negotiations were pending for a meeting of the "A-B-C" diplomatic representatives at Rio de Janeiro to discuss matters of Argentine-Brazilian-Chilean mutual interest.

After arrangements for the gathering had practically been completed, Foreign Minister Bocu called attention to the fact that it would have to be postponed until the treaty had been ratified.

Although there will be a strong effort to secure ratification, the step is also sure to be vigorously fought by an Argentine element, at least, which contends that Brazil and Chile really are unfriendly to their country, and are only trying to get her into a combination which will discourage the preparedness program they maintain she ought to pursue.
