WOOL MARKET IN LAKE IS OPENED

GENERAL PRICE BEING PAID FOR

FLEECES IN LAKE COUNTY IS 30 CENTS, AND MANY SALES ALREADY MADE

LAKEVIEW, Dec. 29.—The wool market in Lake county was opened this week, and up to the present time over 50,000 fleeces have been contracted for. The prevailing price being paid is 30 cents, although some has been sold at a slightly lower figure. Up to the present time no price in excess of this has been reported. Most of the buying has been done by E. H. Clark, who is the local representative of Eisenmann Bros. of Boston, Mass., although a few contracts have been made by Chas. Umbach. No sales have been reported by H. Jones, a buyer from Portland.

It is expected that the buying and selling will continue until the greater part of the 1917 clip of Lake county has been contracted. The only thing that is holding up some of the sales is the fact that the owners are out of town or one of the partners of a firm is with the sheep.

A portion of the sales which have been reported are Tom Sullivan, 2,000 fleeces; Pat Murphy, 2,000; John M. Flynn, 3,500; John C. Flynn, 5,500; O'Callaghan Bros., over 5,000; M. P. J. Barry, 2,000; J. P. McAuliffe, 2,000; S. B. Chandler, 6,000; Dan Chandler, 6,000; J. F. Hanson, 2,000; D. P. Malloy, 1,600; Ches. Parker, 4,000.

STATE WILL SUE FOR INHERITANCE TAXES

SACRAMENTO, Dec. 29.—To determine whether the state is entitled to inheritance taxes from the estate of Ann O'Rourke, Priscilla Ballou and Minnie Nauschilde, late of Sacramento county, friendly suits are to be filed by State Controller Chambers, it was announced today.

The court's findings will decide whether the tax can be collected in view of property transfers made by the three women before they died. If the state wins, about \$50,000 will be added to the income of the state inheritance tax.

Sealed proposals will be received by the Police Judge of the City of Klamath Falls Oregon, up to and including Monday, January 8th, 1917, at the hour of 5 o'clock p. m., for the purchase of City of Klamath Falls improvement bonds, aggregating in amount eleven thousand four hundred and fourteen and 44/100 (\$11,414.54) dollars.
