HIGHWAY CODE TO BE OFFERED

CONFERENCE IN PORTLAND, UNDER DIRECTION OF UNIVERSITY, WILL CONSIDER UNIFORM LAWS GOVERNING ROADMAKING

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Dec. 30.—A conference for furthering the adoption of a highway code for Oregon, will be the form of the eighth annual state commonwealth conference of the University of Oregon. This conference will be held at the Multnomah hotel, Portland, January 3 and 4.

The meeting will precede by a few days the opening of the next session of the legislature. The purpose is to agree upon a highway code for submission to the legislature. Practically all the organizations interested in getting road legislation passed at the forthcoming session have agreed to join in the commonwealth conference and unite, if possible, upon a single measure.

"The prospective of getting a comprehensive highway code through the legislature is accordingly very bright," said F. G. Young, head of the department of economics and sociology at the State University, and director of the commonwealth conference.

"Oregon's need of an up-to-date highway code is at this time exceedingly urgent. Federal aid to the amount of nearly \$3,000,000 during the next few years for the improvement of Oregon roads is available, but will not be forthcoming for the state unless our system of road construction and maintenance is put in order through the adoption of a code based upon principles proved best in older states."

"The tasks of developing a body of road laws that will insure the largest measure of road improvement for every dollar expended involves stupendous difficulties. The legislature should have all the aid possible for this achievement. Hence the contemplated preparation of a code that will embody the best suggestions of all interested. This code will be submitted to the committee on highways in the legislature."

"Some of the best road experts of the nation will be present at the conference of January 3-4. The draft of a code has been in preparation for Oregon during the last three or four months by the United States office of public roads and rural engineering will probably be the nucleus of the code to be hammered into shape."

The conference will open January 3 with J. D. Brown, president of the Farmers' Union of Oregon, presiding. Will Transmit Terms
