Mine Products Larger Oregon Mines Increase Output

Heavy Gains Made in 1916 in Copper and Silver and Slight Increase in Gold Output, According to Geological Survey

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 2.—Preliminary estimates of the production of metals from Oregon mines in 1916 by the United States geological survey show increases over 1915 for gold, silver and copper, and a decrease for lead. The output of gold in 1915 was \$1,861,786, and the estimated output for 1916 is \$1,900,000, an increase of \$38,000. The output of silver in 1915 was 117,947 ounces, and the estimated output in 1916 is 227,500 ounces, or 109,553 ounces more. The output of copper in

1915 was 451,172 pounds, and the estimated output in 1916 is 2,527,000 pounds, an increase for 1916 of 2,076,000 pounds, and the output of lead in 1916 was 22,000 pounds, as compared with 62,957 pounds in 1915, or 41,000 pounds less.

The increase in gold is merely nominal, but that of silver has about doubled. The most notable increase is in the quantity of copper, an increase

There are less than a hundred productive metal mines in Oregon, and the number of placers is about double that of the deep mines. However, two-thirds of the gold output and virtually all that of other metals, is derived from deep mines. No very productive new properties have been opened during the year. The entire output of the deep mines is derived from less than 160,000 tons of ore, having an average value of about \$9 a ton.

Umatilla County Not Dry in 1916

Despite State Prohibition Law, Over \$50,000 Left This County for Booze During Year

PENDLETON, Jan. 3.—It is estimated that not less than \$50,000 went out of Umatilla county during the year just closed for liquor purchased for beverage purposes. While the amount seems enormous, it is said that prior to the first of last year there were several saloons in Pendleton, any one of which had annual receipts equal to that amount.

Actual figures on the amount of liquor received during the year and its cash value are not obtainable yet. However, the number of shipments of liquor can be approximated. The coun-

ty clerk during the year issued 182 affidavit books and there are 100 affidavits in each book. Not all of these affidavits have yet been returned, but it is safe to say that approximately 175,000 individual shipments of liquor have been received in the county during the year.

A big majority of the affidavits show the receipt of two quarts of whiskey, and the average price paid for two quarts of whiskey is about \$2.50. Beer is second on the list, and each shipment of beer represents \$4 to \$6. Little wine was shipped in.

MOONSHINE STILL FOUND AT CANBY

MEN UNDER ARREST IN MARION COUNTY FOR BURGLARY ARE THOUGHT TO BE OWNERS OF BOOZE-MAKING JOINT

OREGON CITY, Jan. 3.—Searching for men who had been stealing from farmers in the neighborhood, officers last week located a whiskey distillery on the banks of the Willamette, four miles west of Canby. On Saturday Sheriff W. J. Wilson and Deputy District Attorney Thomas A. Burke visited the place and destroyed the still. They brought back with them twenty-five feet of lead pipe that had formed part of the apparatus.

Sheriff Wilson suspects A. G. Collins and Leonard Westfall as the owners of the illicit plant. These two men have recently been indicted in Marion county for burglary. The still was concealed near the cabin of A. J. Silver, a blind fisherman, but no liquor was located.

\$30,000 HOME IS BRIDE'S PRESENT

D. M. McLEMORE, WEALTHY CAT. TLE MAN, GIVES MANSION AS NUPTIAL SURPRISE

A beautiful \$30,000 home in San Jose, now being built, is the wedding present D. M. McLemore, one of the wealthiest cattlemen of the West, is making to his pretty bride, with whom he arrived at the Plaza hotel yesterday. A quiet wedding, which took place in Klamath Falls, Ore., comes as a complete surprise to McLemore's many friends and fellow club members in San Francisco, where he has resided for the last year. The couple are en route to Honolulu, and are taking a large touring car with them.

McLemore is the man who paid a cool \$10,000 in American gold coin to Villa after he captured the state of Sonora. He had purchased 10,000 head of cattle in Sonora before Villa came, and to obtain the Mexican chief's permission to export the cattle to the United States he had to pay \$4 a head tax on the consignment.

"I took the money across the line in suitcases, and Villa was as fine as silk. He always is when you bring him money," McLemore related yesterday.

Mrs. McLemore was formerly Miss Winifred Wampler of Klamath Falls, Ore. She is a daughter of M. H. Wampler, owner of timber lands. The Wampers have a home in Klamath Falls and a big ranch in the country. Mrs. McLemore graduated at Klamath Falls and afterward attended college in Portland. Her father's principal hobby being bear hunting, his daughter has accompanied him on many trips, riding forty miles a day, and even shooting bears herself. She is an expert horsewoman, and has many friends in Klamath Falls and Portland.
