

WOMEN NOW HAVE TOWN IN CONTROL

FROM MAYOR TO POLICE FORCE, WOMEN NOW HOLD REINS OF GOVERNMENT IN NORTHEASTERN OREGON TOWN

UMATILLA, Ore., Jan. 5.—Umatilla's city government passed this week into the hands of a woman administration. From Mrs. Laura Starcher, mayor, down to the police department, all officials are of the gentler sex except two lonely males who must serve as "hold-overs" in the council.

E. E. Starcher, railroad telegrapher, handed over the reins of office to his wife. He vacated the little room where he has directed the town's destinies for many months, and the madam took the helm. One of Mrs. Starcher's first acts will be to name the woman police force.

"A woman can do the work," said Mayoress Starcher, "better than any man." She added that if any obstreperous lawbreaker invaded Umatilla during the female regime, a man or something would be designated to handle the situation, under orders from the chiefess.

On taking office Mrs. Starcher promised the city a business administration, and said she would effect improvements her husband's regime failed to attempt.

County Unit Plan for Rural Schools Talked

Authority in All Schools Not in First Class Would Be Centralized in County Superintendent to Increase Efficiency

SALEM, Jan. 5.—The county unit plan for all schools in districts below the first class probably will be presented to the legislature for enactment into law.

State Superintendent of Schools Churchill, who so strongly favors the plan, discussed it with the county school superintendents in session at the capitol in the capacity of an examining board.

The plan is to centralize the authority over all the schools in a county, excepting those in districts of the first class. Each county adopting the plan would be divided into five districts. Each district would elect a member of the county school board. This board of five members would appoint a county school superintendent, who would be the practical educational and business head of the schools in the county.

The county school superintendent would nominate the teachers for all the schools. He would place the

teachers where they could do the best work. The taxes for the schools would be levied on a county unit basis.

Where the county unit has been adopted, Mr. Churchill said, great benefit has resulted, particularly to the rural schools as a trained county superintendent, with proper authority, is more able to establish and maintain an efficient school than are the average rural school directors.

Later with several business associates he obtained control of the Raymond & Whitecomb company, of which organization he became vice president. When Seward Prosser, now president of the Bankers Trust company, was made president of the Liberty National bank some four years ago, he invited Mr. Gibson to accompany him as assistant to the president.

Europe Has Queer Ideas of America

Italian Woman Says People From Indiana Really Didn't Look Much Like Real Indians

ROME, Dec. 3.—(By mail)—Buffalo Bill's Wild West has "advertised" America throughout Europe. His circus, playing frequently to European spectators, has left a trail of false impressions behind it. The American "movies" shown here only emphasize them.

The case of Madame Montre, interviewed today in a Roman boarding house, is by no means uncommon. She is a well known writer and literary woman.

"Oh, you are an American," she began. "I am so glad to meet you. For I am making a scientific study of America. I was recently presented to some people from a state called Indiana. Really they didn't look so much

like Indians. Of course, their manners were a little off.

"It must be very difficult for one to live in the states. The constant clash of the American and the Indian civilization is undoubtedly a nerve-racking annoyance.

"Of course, the poor Indians really did give a civilization to the world. They were a simple and a natural people, having a real art and a real literature. The Indian at least has blood, and not machine oil, in his veins. Naturally, there are some savages, the good being always mixed with the bad."

JOHNSON STARTS; STEPHENS STOPS

PRESENT GOVERNOR OF CALIFORNIA WILL OPEN LEGISLATURE, BUT HIS SUCCESSOR WILL BE IN CHAIR AT FINISH

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 5.—Although Governor Hiram Johnson will supervise the introduction of principal matters to come before the state legislature starting here next Monday, the business of final approval or rejection will rest with William D. Stephens, former United States congressman, who from present indications will advance from the place of lieutenant governor to that of governor on or about March 4th, when Johnson becomes United States senator.

During the first month of the session bills will be introduced. The lawmakers will have a vacation during February, and in March and April the bills will be voted on and put up to the new governor. Just how far Stephens will go toward concurring in the Johnson principles remains to be seen.

BILLINGS TAKES NOTES ON TRIAL

MAN CONVICTED OF MURDER FOR PART IN BOMB OUTRAGE APPEARS AT TRIAL OF CONFEDERATE THOMAS MOONEY

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 5.—Warren K. Billings, convicted of murder in connection with the preparedness parade dynamiting, is appearing in court during the trial of Tom Mooney, in the role of county jail reporter. He takes copious notes for the benefit of his associates in jail. Miss Eleanor Fitzgerald, secretary to Alex. Beakman, directing spirit of the Mooney defense, also appears during the session as a reporter for several papers. It became apparent early in the trial that the principles of anarchism are going to get a thorough airing before the trial is ended. Both the prosecution and defense attorneys have asked all veniremen in detail regarding their ideas in connection with socialism and anarchism and their definition of what these movements mean.
