Ministers Protest to Showing of "Purity"

Ask J. V. Houston, Manager of Opera House, Not to Exhibit Film Showing Nude of Woman as Purity

The first official protest made to the exhibition of a moving picture in Klamath Falls was made today when the ministerial association of this city protested to J. V. Houston against showing "Purity" at the opera house tonight and tomorrow night. Mr. Houston said he has a contract with the film company for exhibition of the pictures, and must show it or lose heavily.

"The protest is altogether friendly, and is made by the ministerial association, and not by any church," said Rev. W. E. Rambo of the Christian church, when asked about the protest. "The sheriff in Chehalis, Wash., stopped the exhibition of the picture there recently. We regard it as bad for the morals of this community."

"Of course, we can only protest to Mr. Houston. The law may step in if the officials feel the picture is indecent."

"Purity" is a seven reel allegorical play, showing a nude woman as a symbol of purity and virtue. The story is beautiful, and tries to prove Purity's own philosophy of life: "Unto the pure, all things are pure."

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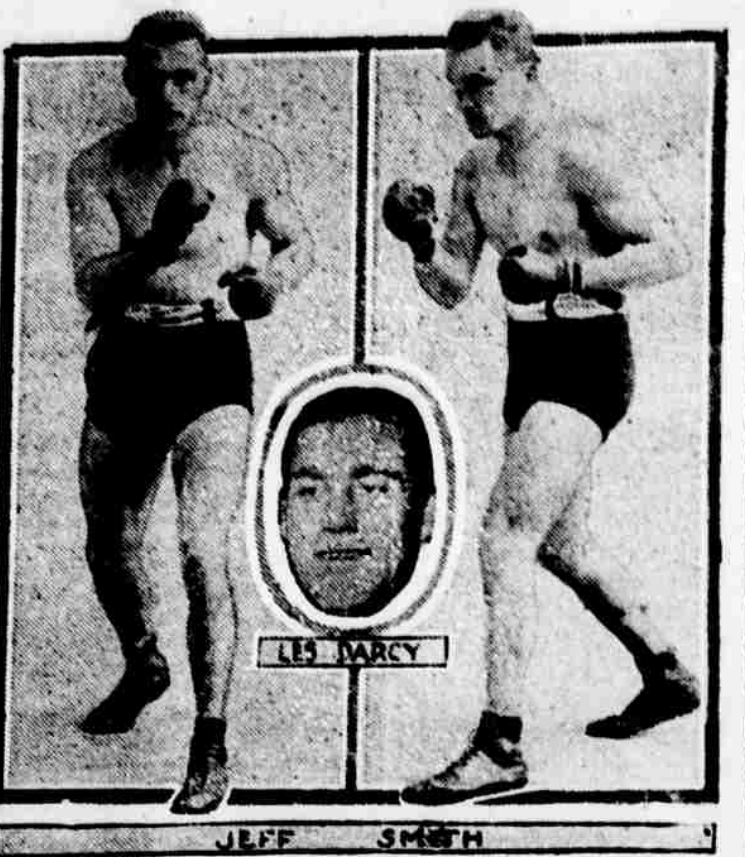
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New Jersey Boy Who Knocked Out Les Darcy



Les Darcy, the Australian middleweight champion, over whom much ado has been kicked up in pugilistic circles since he arrived in the United States, has shown no inclination to box Jeff Smith, the Bayonne, N. J. middleweight. Smith beat him in five rounds in Sydney, Australia, January 23, 1915. Darcy claimed a foul and refused to continue. The referee, however, saw no foul and gave the fight to Smith. May 23 of the same year Darcy won from Smith on a foul in two rounds at Sydney.

"I am anxious to get the first chance at Darcy," said Smith. "Before he can claim an enormous purse in the United States he ought to be willing to box me. I will beat him just as I beat him in Australia."

"I don't think any boxing promoter should put Smith on," said Darcy when he was asked about such a match. "He is a foul fighter, and his kind of boxing is not good for the game."

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Lawyer Wanted for Murder Kills Self

Bernard W. Lewis Commits Suicide in Hotel Just Before Detectives Seeking Him Batter Down Door

ATLANTIC CITY, Jan. 5.—Bernard Wesley Lewis, sought in connection with the murder of Maudie Colbert in Philadelphia, committed suicide in his hotel last night just before detectives battered down the door.

Warrants Were Out. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 5.—Before the suicide of Bernard W. Lewis, wanted for the murder of Maudie Colbert here, was reported this morning, detention warrants for his arrest were sent broadcast over the country. It is now believed that he was in the taxicab which stopped at the apartments of Miss Colbert the day she was murdered.

Evidence Increases. The chain of circumstantial evidence surrounding Bernard Lewis, who committed suicide when sought for the murder of Maudie Colbert, is growing. A Morristown lawyer this afternoon identified Lewis' picture as that of the man who rushed into his office a few days ago and asked to be defended on a murder charge.
