ALLIES DEMAND THAT TURKS MOVE

INTRUDING NATION MUST RETIRE FROM EUROPE AND GERMANY MUST GIVE UP INVADABLE TERRITORY, SAYS ALLIES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 11.—The reply of the entente powers to President Wilson's note reached Washington today. The note is couched in clear strong language, containing an unmistakable definition of what the allies are fighting for.

Germans Must Get Out

LONDON, Jan. 11.—It is understood that the allies note to the United States contains the following terms, to which Germany must agree before peace can be signed: Evacuation of all territory the Germans have invaded and now occupy. Retirement of Turkey from Europe. Reparation for all invaded territory.

Greece May Accept

ATHENS, Jan. 10.—The crown council of Greece is reported to favor acceptance of the allies' demands as outlined in the note just received. The ultimatum was delivered to Greece yesterday, and insisted on a reply within forty-eight hours. The ultimatum also required an immediate acceptance. The first demands were served December 31st.
