How is Your Co-ordination?
Try This Test

If you can't shut your eyes, extend one arm at full length and then bring it back, finding the point of your nose without the aid of sight, there is something the matter with your co-ordination, and, according to the Life Extension Institute, of which William H. Taft is the chairman of the board of directors, you should consult a physician. In the whole test the patient is required to try to touch the tip of the nose with the fingers of either hand. Then she is asked to bring together—without opening her eyes—the finger tips themselves. If she succeeds in these tests there is no symptom of what the neurologists call inco-ordination.

Bills Introduced in Senate

Following are among the more important bills introduced in the Oregon legislature since it convened Monday: Senate Bills

Lewis—Changing the boundary line between Clackamas and Multnomah counties.

Lewis—Amending election laws relating to county central committees, providing that county clerk shall notify them of their election.

Olson—Regulating corporations organized to build dams, booms, etc., and placing them under jurisdiction of public service commission.

Olson—To provide for the support and maintenance of illegitimate children and define the obligations of the father and mother.

Barrett—Providing for one state board of education of three members to have charge of educational institutions and all educational matters.

Barrett—Abolishing the state tax commission and placing its duties with the state board of control, with authority to hire an expert.

Barrett—Establishing a department of industrial insurance, which shall perform the duties of labor commissioner, the industrial welfare commis-

sion, the industrial accident commission and the board of inspectors of child labor.

Barrett—Consolidating the desert land board and the state land board.

Barrett—Consolidating the corporations and insurance departments and creating a corporation insurance commission.

Smith of Josephine—Authorizing state highway commission to pay \$15,000 out of state road fund for construction of road from Graves Creek to Macklin Gulch on Pacific highway in Josephine county.

Smith of Josephine—Enforcing matrimony in certain cases and giving name to illegitimate children.

Strayer—Amending law relating to conveyance of mining claims.

Dimick—Providing a closed season for Chinese pheasants until October 1, 1919, and thereafter permitting open season through month of October only.

Strayer—Continuing homestead exemption after death.

Strayer—Repealing §313, as amended, and §320, as amended, of Lord's Oregon laws, relating to time for county courts to establish road districts.

Bills Introduced in House

House Bills

Lewis—Providing additional methods of appeal to the supreme court.

Sweeney—Regulating operation of vehicles on public roads.

Deschutes County Delegation—Fixing salary of officers of Jefferson county as follows: Judge \$600 per annum; clerk \$1,200 per annum; sheriff \$500 per annum; assessor \$1,000 per annum; school superintendent, \$900 per annum and traveling expenses not to exceed \$100; treasurer, \$600.

Laurgaard—Providing for redemption of real property by judgment debtors.

Anderson—Appropriating \$25,000 a year for two years for Pacific Northwest Tourist Association.

Anderson—Appropriating \$5,000 annually for experiment station in Hood River county.

Tichenor—To establish a dead line across Rogue River and prohibiting all manner of fishing except with hook and line for salmon or other species of fish below and west of such line.

Mueller—Requiring that road supervisor shall be appointed by petition.

Mueller—Requiring consent of wife or husband or parents for assignment of wages.

Mueller—Compelling employer to deduct amount of tax levy from wages of alien employees.

Stafrin—Reducing salary of district attorney of Polk county to \$1,200 per annum.

Lewis—To prohibit manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquor and providing bone dry legislation.

Lewis—To prohibit manufacture and sale of proprietary medicines.

Brownell—To repeal Oregon-Washington joint law regulating fishing in Columbia River.

Bowman—To provide for regulation of non-resident dependent children.

Bowman—Providing for recording of certificates of sale and assignments.

Bowman—Regulating disposition of stray animals.

Bowman—To prohibit circulation of

initiative, referendum and recall petitions for hire.

Bowman—Amending section 6320 of Lord's Oregon laws, limiting county tax levy to 10 mills.

Beauregard—To amend laws requiring railroads to file annual reports on December 31st.

Deschutes delegation—Fixing terms of court in Deschutes county.

Clark—Relating to the duties of the county school superintendent of Sherman county in supervising class work.

Crandall—Requiring court summons to state whether plaintiff is resident of state.

Crandall—Requiring court pleadings to be subscribed to by resident of state or resident attorney.

Deschutes delegation—Fixing salaries of officials of Deschutes county.

Callan—To provide for foreclosure of mortgages other than first mortgages on real property.

Callan—To provide for advertisement of sale of school district bonds and notes.

Walter B. Jones—To require county court of Lane county to purchase grounds and buildings for fair purpose.

Walter B. Jones—Empowering district governments to make tax levies.

Walter B. Jones—Repealing law providing for county school supervisors.

Walter B. Jones—Fixing school census in last week of October instead of last week in November.

Bean—Empowering state government to issue such bonds as may be needed to meet federal road fund for period of five years.

Mueller—Regulating livestock running at large in Columbia county.

Clatsop delegation—To prohibit fishing for salmon with purse seines.

Brownell—Changing manner of payment of supreme court salaries.

Brownell—Exempting earnings of debtor from garnishment to extent of \$100.

Brownell—Fixing salary of Clackamas county school superintendent at \$1,500.

ARMS, HANDS AND
LEGS ARE BLOWN
OFF WORKINGMENSIXTEEN ARE DEAD AS RESULT
OF EXPLOSIONS

Canadian Car Foundry and Ammunition Plant is Wrecked by Explosions, Which Continue for Hours, and Produce Shock Felt for Thirty Miles—1,400 Men Were in Plant When First Explosion Was Heard.

NEW YORK, Jan. 12.—Sixteen are known to be dead and scores injured as the result of a series of explosions yesterday afternoon which wrecked portions of the plant of the Canadian Car Foundry and Ammunition Company in New Jersey.

The explosions continued for several hours, growing more frequent late in the evening. For a long time it was impossible for firemen to approach the plant.

The fire is spreading, threatening Kingsland. The shock from the explosions was felt for thirty miles.

Fourteen hundred men were in the plant when the first explosion occurred. The injured are being brought to hospitals in droves, with arms and legs and hands blown off, and others with serious body wounds.

Intermittent explosions and bursting stray shells continued today. The loss is estimated at about \$12,000,000.
