New Projects Not Likely No Funds for New Construction

Reports Submitted by Various Project Managers Show There is Barely Enough Money to Drive Ahead on Projects Now Under Way

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 15.—The total estimated resources of the reclamation fund for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1918, are \$8,283,000. The estimated expenditures for the same year for all existing projects, are \$8,283,000. There's the rub, so far as securing money for construction of new projects from the reclamation fund is concerned. These estimates were made up a few months ago in detail from the reports submitted by project managers, before Secretary Lane had any thought of submitting to congress any estimates for new projects.

The department is committed to these estimates as about the best that can be devised for carrying the present projects toward completion. It may also be said to be committed to the principle that existing projects have the best claim to any money that comes from the reclamation fund, and that so long as this fund is not large enough to drive ahead at full speed on the projects under way, it should not be drawn upon to supply money for new projects.

Only Two Ways to Get Money
This attitude, it is declared, must not be construed as unfriendliness to new projects. Secretary Lane feels that he has answered criticisms of that sort by preparing estimates for congress for the Malheur project in Oregon and King's Hill in Idaho, as well as by the vast amount of work performed in gathering data and getting ready for numerous new projects and

extensions as soon as funds can be had for them.

But it seems unlikely that the secretary will go further than he has gone. The question as to where the funds shall come from is held to be a matter for congress. The estimates of the department for continuing present projects exactly equals the estimated receipts. There are only two ways to get the money. One, by paring other project estimates to provide enough to begin the new ones, whereas there would doubtless be strenuous opposition on the part of any project that might be pared. The other source is by appropriation from the general fund.

Authorization is Necessary
Here a little knowledge of the rules of congressional procedure is necessary to an adequate understanding of what is sometimes called the "law-making game." If a proposed expenditure comes along in the estimates submitted by a department of the government, it makes a great difference whether it is for new work or for continuing work on something already begun. If a public building has been authorized at a preceding session, or a river and harbor improvement adopted or a reclamation project begun, an estimate for funds needed to carry the work along is normally granted. In some cases less money may be granted than was asked, but it becomes a question of how much.

But if the thing under consideration

is new, it must first be "authorized." Anything that is new cannot get into the big annual supply bills if a single member objects. They are subject to a point of order as new legislation. So if the committee on appropriations were persuaded to provide money for new projects, the item would be at the mercy of any member who chose to object after the matter came to the floor of the house.

Likelihood is Not Great
This is where the Malheur-King's Hill plans tangle up with the house rules. If they could be dragged, pulled or smuggled in under the head of reclamation fund they would not fall victims to a point of order. If they come along as new authorizations at the expense of the general fund, their life becomes a fragile thing.

If the appropriations committee would itself take the initiative and cut down the allowance for some of the other projects sufficiently to provide a margin for work on the new project with funds from the reclamation receipts, the thing could be done in that way. But no such labor as that can be expected from the committee unless it were advised by the proper department that such a change was deemed desirable.

For the reasons before pointed out, it is not believed that the reclamation service will change the course it has marked out, under which the existing projects are considered its favorite children until enough funds have accumulated to enlarge the family circle.

JUDGE DUFFY, AT BEND, SUSTAINS MOTION TO STRIKE OUT
PORTION OF ORIGINAL COMPLAINT.

BEND, Jan. 15.—Deschutes county scored its first victory on Friday in its fight to maintain its individuality as a separate corporation, when Judge T. E. Duffy sustained the defendant's motion to strike out a portion of the original complaint.
