The campaign against stray dogs, and especially against dogs not muzzled, is being carried forth with vigor, says the chief. To date rabies has appeared among dogs in Klamath Falls, and Chief Baldwin is determined that it shall not spread, if he can prevent it by killing unmuzzled dogs.

TURNER SUES TO COLLECT DAMAGE

LOCAL BARBER CHARGES E. L. HOPKINS ALIENATED AFFECTIONS OF MRS. TURNER TO DAMAGE OF \$25,000

Charging that Eugene Hopkins has alienated the affections of his wife and broken up his home, Jesse Turner today filed suit in the circuit court against Hopkins to recover \$25,000 damages.

Hopkins, a farmer of the Lower Klamath Lake district, was admitted to the Turner home as a guest by the plaintiff, the complaint sets forth, but gradually became an unwelcome element in the house, and alienated Mrs. Turner from the plaintiff.
