# Indians' Needs Recited Must Have Money to Progress

Man Familiar With Klamath Indians Says They Are Worth \$25,000 Per Capita in Tribal Assets and Should Be Able to Get Capital

"He who would be well served must serve well."

The learned pope was forever and eternally right when he said, "The proper study of mankind is man." The aspirant for fame or fortune has at last come to realize that enduring success can only be attained by contributing to the world's store of valuable knowledge. Thus, "to serve" is the motto of the ambitious and the wise. The nobility of service has been recognized since history began.

The facts stand out in contour as huge and high as Olympus, and lead the student back to the cradle of the race, even to the Troglydite of the Paleolithic age before man had learned to co-operate with Mother Nature to the extent of growing a blade of barley. The evolution of the human race has been, Oh! so slow. The time required for the transformation of the jellyfish into the amphibian is measured only by eons. The development of the foot from the claw count- less ages, and the time from when man roamed the primordial forests with

shining tusks, bellowing and roaring in quest of prey until he had evolved sufficient intellect to take cognizance of the infinite hand of God and the workings of Nature is absolutely beyond computation.

The progress of mankind moved not with alacrity until man sought to serve and succor his fellow man. The first public servant of which we take notes dates back to the hazy dawn when the chief of his cave clan had more power than all his group combined, because he thought out ways of egress and ingress from rude caves and ledges. He was powerful because he thought out ways of escaping danger and protecting the weak. He studied and knew the ways of the cave bear, wolverine and the great saber-toothed tiger. He made crude weapons with which to combat them and protect his clan.

Another of the world's benefactors and primitive servants we find standing on the shore of the boundless and to him, mysterious ocean, observing the operations of the coral insect and learning thereby the most valuable of all lessons ever gleaned by scientist, sage or observer. The value of intelligent co-operation. Thus the world's

first scientist and observer, the observer of the coral and the ant, laid the foundation of a science upon which has been built the world's greatest institutions, nations, states, financial and industrial institutions. Upon the sequel of the fundamental principles of the science of co-operation hinged the destiny of the human race. We find the benefactors of the human race have been the world's enlightened servants, space nor time upon this occasion does not permit mention of their names, but among the foremost might be classed the divine Plutarch, the immortal Shakespeare and our own learned Franklin, whose capacious brain could contain both lightning rods and constitutions, and who was incidentally the progenitor of Bell, Edison and many of their type who are yet to follow. and rapid development of Europe following the establishment of her modern banks. The establishment of the bank of Amsterdam on January 1, 1609, increased the commerce of Holland and made that city a leading center in international dealings. To know the history of Germany and her wonderful progress along commercial lines is necessary to be conversant with the history of the bank of Hamburg, which was established in 1619. The history of Venice constitutes principally the story of her banks and houses of exchange, beginning with the Banco d'Italia, which was established by the Venetian senate in 1584 and 1587. The bank is said to be the first public bank in Europe. Banking in England is said to have originated by the dealings carried on by the goldsmiths which culminated in the construction of the Bank of England in 1694, with capital of 1,200,000 pounds, at which time was placed Sir John Houblon as Michael Godfrey. To many, the most interesting history ever written is "Roger's History of the Bank of England." The history of the Bank of Pennsylvania established in 1780, and the Bank of the North America, which was authorized in congress on March 28, 1781, with a capital of \$400,000. Many centuries we find the progress of nations synonymous with the foundation perfection and expansion of the banking and currency systems. A glance at our history is quite enlightening.

Let us consider for a moment the predictions and prophecies of the truthful and the wise. We are informed that we are soon to enjoy the greatest era of prosperity that we as a nation have ever known as a result of the cent progressive currency legislation. Legislation making it possible for the national banks to absorb \$450,000,000 of farm mortgages was passed recently and pride by our national legislators. The enacting of laws making
