MUNITION PLANT EXPLODES; 30 DIE

BODIES ARE RECOVERED FROM WRECKAGE—AT LEAST 100 INJURED—MUCH DAMAGE TO PROPERTY SUSTAINED

LONDON, Jan. 20.—It is announced that thirty bodies have been recovered from the wreckage of the munitions plant which exploded last night.

Forty people are believed to have been killed and at least 100 injured.

The factory was completely destroyed and the explosion caused the start of fire in neighboring factories. Three rows of houses were completely demolished and considerable damage was done to other property.

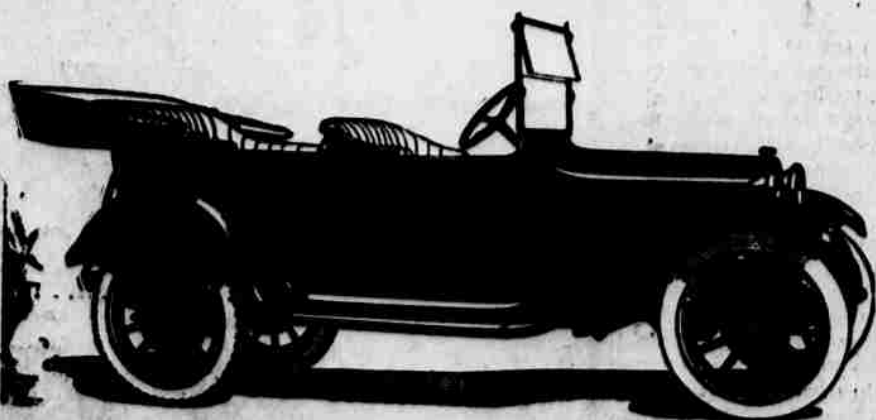
