Future of Tourist Trade in Klamath Looks Bright

Building of New Roads on Klamath Reservation and in Crater Lake Park and New Fish Hatchery May Mean Much for Klamath

With \$25,000 of the Klamath Indian school fund to be used for road building, with more roads to be constructed and hard surfaced in Crater Lake National park, with the Strahorn Railroad now more than a probability, and with a gigantic campaign launched by the Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, the prospects for the year 1917 and future years are bright indeed. This is an auspicious time: Klamath is expected to blossom forth very soon into its full possibilities. A dispatch from Washington says: "The senate Indian committee has put upon the Indian appropriation bill at Senator Phelan's request, a provision for the authorization of the use of \$25,000 of the Klamath Indian school funds for road building purposes. To become effective this action must be ratified by the senate and house." In addition to road work, a large area of fertile land in the Yainax country is expected to be put under irrigation this year. Much of the preliminary work was done last year, and

NO RELATIVES OF BOOM ARE FOUND

FILED ON HOMESTEAD IN 1912. NO BELONGINGS OF UNFORTUNATE MAN TO INDICATE RELATIVES HAVE BEEN FOUND

No trace of relatives of Elmer Boom, who committed suicide at Merrill several days ago, has been found by Coroner A. A. Soule.

James F. Burgess of the United States land office at Lakeview, writes that he filed on the homestead on the 16th of October, 1912. There is nothing in the office of Coroner Soule which would indicate any other possessor than Merrill, or any relatives.

T. M. Durhan of Merrill will go to Boom's homestead when the road or trail is open, and see if he can find anything there that would indicate relatives. It is reported that his belongings at the homestead are very meager.

On his person were no clues of his relations. A silver watch and a knife were found on his person, and turned over to the county treasurer.
