SAYS CORSETS DEFORM BABIES

INDIANA WOMAN WILL ASK LEGISLATURE FOR LAW ABOLISHING CORSETS—CALLS THEM WHALEBONE PRISONS

INDIANAPOLIS, Jan. 23.—Mrs. Anna Hoeltke, the woman who will ask the legislature to pass a law abolishing corsets in Indiana, today declared that "the corset has killed more women and children than whiskey, tobacco, war and famine."

"This worse than barbarous custom," said she, "of deforming the waists of girls and women, is far more injurious than the savage custom of flattening the head or the Chinese custom of binding feet."

"Reports indicate that thousands of deformed babies are born every year as the result of mothers binding their waists with corsets. The government has passed laws prohibiting the sale of habit forming drugs. What is the government going to do to prevent the coming generation from living in a whalebone prison before birth?"

NEGRO PLAYS RAGTIME BY HIS ELECTRIC CHAIR

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Jan. 23.—In the Ohio penitentiary death cell, Robert Ellis, colored, plays ragtime for hours at a time on a mouth harp.

Not ten feet away is the electric chair in which he's doomed to die on the morning of February 6th.

"The music helps him forget," said Warden P. P. Thomas today.

Evidence in Ellis' trial shows he, with two other prisoners in the Hamilton county jail at Cincinnati, played cards to see who'd kill the matron to get her keys and escape. Ellis drew the card.

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FAVORS RESERVE CAMP FOR BOYS

MAN WHO STUDIED CONDITIONS ON MEXICAN BORDER ADVOCATES SYSTEM OF RESERVATION TRAINING CAMPS

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—A national system of "reservation training camps" for use in the mobilization of troops in case of war was recommended in a report today to the National Civic Federation by Dr. Thomas Darlington, former health commissioner for New York, on his investigation of conditions surrounding the national guardsmen and regulars at the Mexican border.

A defense of the personnel of the militia, a plea for universal military service, sharp criticism on account of unpreparedness, red tape and other evils, and suggestions for further improvement in the training, transportation, subsistence and care of soldiers, based on the experience of the recent mobilization, are prominent features of the report.

Dr. Darlington said boys in schools and colleges have enough to do without military training courses being added, but he favors their entrance at a "reserve camp" after graduation.
