

British Labor Party to Have Demands After War

When Peace Throw Men Back Into Industrial Life Recognition of Unions Will Be Demanded and a Job for Every Laborer Who Left His Job

MANCHESTER, England, Jan. 23.—The eyes of capital and labor throughout Europe focused on the sixteenth annual conference of the British labor party here today.

What labor shall demand after the

greatest war in history was the clear cut issue. Resolutions before the conference today indicated that labor will fight to remodel shattered industrial relations more radically than ever in labor's favor. Revolutionary demands will be made on the government.

It had been practically decided before the hundreds of delegates assembled that when demobilization throws hundreds of thousands of workers back into the industrial boiling pot, the unions will demand that the government provide work for every man who left his job on account of the war. Immediate restitution of the full rights and privileges of unions, withdrawn during the war, also will be asked.

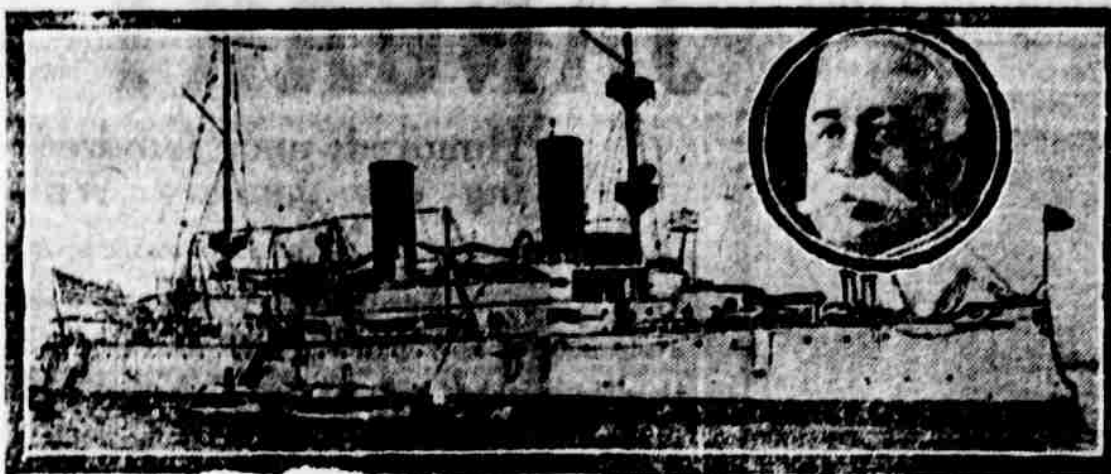
A demand for a general eight hour law and a minimum wage is believed sure to pass the conference. It is equally decided that the unions will demand the nationalization of productive industries—mines, etc.—a radical educational reform, profit sharing schemes and other things.

Numerous resolutions, so far framed, repudiate the government's proposal to create compulsory arbitration of labor disputes. Immediate negotiations for peace are demanded by many delegations, but this issue, it is believed, will have no great support. A demand that women now replacing men in hundreds of occupations, shall be guaranteed remunerative employment after the war is placed in the same class as peace.

If the main issues of the conference, however, are carried, British unions will struggle in the future for a stronger institution than the American Federation of Labor.

The delegates look to the support of Arthur Henderson, the government's labor advisor, who is also secretary of the labor party. Henderson, four months ago, called upon every union council in the British Isles to lay down its ideas for labor's post war program. The resolutions before the conference today sum up the situation.
