

COUPLE HAVE A BLACK WEDDING IN NEW YORK

FIRST OF ITS KIND IN THE UNITED STATES

Couple Were Dressed in Black, Had Black Waiters, Black Cars, Black Coffee and Black Bread—Used a Black Express—Bridegroom Declares Black is Ideal Color for Weddings, and is Cheaper.

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Ora Coo, the Powder Puff Prince, and designer of women's garb, and Eleanor Klager, fashion model, were married at St. Vincent de Paul's here today. Theirs was the first "black wedding" on record.

Except for the white principals, the affair was as black as the ace of spades. Wedding traditions were hauled out in a bunch and smashed to pieces. The bride was clad in jet black from her hair and earrings to her toes. The groom wore a black suit, black silk shirt, black linen collar and black gloves.

Later the wedding breakfast at the bride's home was served by black waiters in black. The menu consisted of blackberry cocktails, black bean, black bread, black coffee. It seemed like everything black in the world was there but despair.

"Black," said the bridegroom, "is the ideal color for weddings. As mourning it is losing its significance. No one wears mourning any more. And black is cheaper and more serviceable than any other color."

The couple departed on the Black Diamond express for a honeymoon tour through the principal cities of the West. They said they would give these places a chance to look them over.

Owners of grades or mongrels can here buy pure bred sires at prices that will enable them to get into the purebred business. Pure bred breeders will have a chance to build up their herds at reasonable cost. This list just about ends all excuses for further use of grades and mongrels.

Again He Assumes Role of Initiator of Peace



Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, again has taken the initiative for peace. His epoch making speech of yesterday will be considered by the senate Monday. President Wilson proposed to add the authority and power of America to the authority of other nations to guarantee peace and justice throughout the world. He laid down the following basis for peace:

Peace founded on equality of rights. United, independent and autonomous

plan of organization. Freedom of all nations for the full development of their resources. Direct outlet to all nations to the great highways of the seas, and freedom of the seas to all nations. Limitation of naval and military armament.

President Wilson proposed that all nations adopt the Monroe doctrine as a world doctrine, and avoid any entangling alliance which might drive them into competition for power.

PREPAREDNESS IS STAMPED ON COIN

FIGURE OF LIBERTY TEARING COVER FROM SHIELD AND HOLDING OLIVE BRANCH ON NEW QUARTERS ISSUED TODAY

NEW YORK, Jan. 23.—Peace and preparedness is writ large in the spirit of the design on both sides of the new 25-cent pieces issued from the treasury here today. The new quarters are issued today from the other sub-treasuries in the country also.

On the obverse of the quarter Liberty is shown, a full-length figure from the upper to the lower rim of the coin. Her head is turned to the left, and she is shown stepping forward the gateway of the country. On the gateway wall is the familiar "In God We Trust." Miss Liberty is also in the act of tearing the cover from her trusty shield, typifying her attitude toward protection. In her right hand she holds forth an olive branch. These two symbolize peace and protection.

On the reverse is an eagle in full flight, wings spread across the coin. The designer is Herman A. MacNeill, and his initial, "M" is visible on the coin only with a microscope.

Explosion Kills 69

GERMAN VESSELS SENT TO BOTTOM

TWO DESTROYERS ARE SUNK IN NORTH SEA BY BRITISH WITH THREE OFFICERS AND 44 MEN KILLED, SAYS LONDON

LONDON, Jan. 23.—British sea forces this afternoon sank two German destroyers in two engagements in the North Sea. The official announcement says the "German forces were considerably punished."

In the first engagement near the Dutch coast one destroyer was sunk, and in the second engagement near Schouwenbank another destroyer hit a torpedo. Later the British battleships sank her.

Three German officers and forty-four men were killed.

Galsen Walker Dekol was purchased when a short yearling by Ezell Brothers for \$1,000. The animal was three years old when it died. Cause of the death of the bull is unknown; he was fed a little mouldy hay Saturday night, but the same kind of hay did not affect other stock.
