CHILD LABOR DAY TO BE OBSERVED

NO FALLING OFF IN INTEREST IN CHILD LABOR PROBLEM WITH PASSAGE OF FEDERAL LAW, SAYS NATIONAL COMMITTEE

NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—There has been no decrease in the interest in child labor since the enactment of the federal child labor law, according to a statement by the national child labor committee.

"We were somewhat afraid there would be a tendency to withdraw support from the work of the committee under the misapprehension that the federal law ended the child labor problem," said Owen R. Lovejoy, general secretary of the national child labor committee, "but it is evident from the thousands of promises to observe Child Labor Day we have received that there is no diminution in interest, but that, on the contrary, people are keenly alive to the importance of the work which remains to be done."

Child Labor Day falls on Sunday, January 28th, this year, and requests for material have come from nearly 6,000 organizations which will cooperate with the national child labor committee. January 27th will be observed by synagogues and January 29th by schools, clubs, colleges, and other organizations. Special emphasis will be laid on the children who will not be affected by the federal law—the newsies, the messengers, the clerks, the cashgirls, the delivery boys, and all of the other 1,850,000 children the federal law cannot reach because they are employed in local occupations. A special pamphlet, "Child Labor in Your State," has been prepared, showing why these occupations should be regulated, and what standards the states should establish. In the schools where Child Labor Day is observed, an effort will be made to convince children that it does not pay to go to work too soon. For this the national child labor committee has published another pamphlet, "More Education Pays," which shows with great clearness the difference in earning power between the boy who goes to work at 14 and the one who begins at 18.

PORTLAND WOMAN WRITES TELLING HOW BITE FROM RABBIT DOG OR COYOTE MAY BE CURED BY A POULTICE

Seeing an article in the Oregon Journal of Portland which told of P. W. Snyder of Swan Lake Valley losing a dog by rabies, Emily Hubbard of that city has written to Mr. Snyder the following cure for rabies:

"Run to the house and get an onion about two inches in diameter and a few cents worth of tobacco. Then get two tablespoonful of table salt, cut the onion and tobacco fine with a knife and mix in the salt. Place this poultice on the wound. Make a new poultice every six hours until the wound gets better, and then every twelve hours. It will never swell."

AMERICANS STILL CAN SHOOT RIFLE

UNITED STATES MARINE OFFICERS SAY THEIR MEN ARE UP-HOLDING FAME OF FRONTIER AMERICANS AS RIFLEMEN

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—Declarations that since the days of frontier life have passed, Americans are no longer entitled to their former fame as riflemen are completely refuted by statistics, say officers of the U. S. Marines. These officers recently compiled data showing that splendid shooting qualities are still characteristic of American troops.

More than 73 per cent of the 6,141 members of the United States marine corps who fired during 1916 on the fourteen marine corps rifle ranges are expert riflemen; 1,044, or 17 per cent, are sharpshooters, and 2,518, or 41 per cent, are marksmen.
