LOCAL DELEGATES HOME FROM BOISE

GRIFFITH, FRY AND CAMP RETURN FROM OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE CONFERENCE AT BOISE, IDAHO

Project Manager J. G. Camp and Water Master George Fry and Judge J. B. Griffith have returned from Boise, where they attended a conference on operation and maintenance. They report a splendid conference.

By order of I. D. O'Donnell, supervisor of operation, the project managers and water masters of the Truckee-Carson, Klamath, Umatilla, North Yakima, Okanogan, Boise, Minaloka and Strawberry Valley projects met at Boise, Idaho, to discuss operation and maintenance of irrigation projects.

He also invited delegates from all the water users associations and from all the private irrigation projects in Southern Idaho, Eastern Oregon and Northern Utah. Altogether there were eighty-one delegates in attendance. The conference worked hard from 9 a. m. till 12 m., 1:30 p. m. to 6 p. m.; 7:30 p. m. till 10 p. m.

Twenty principal topics were discussed. First, a paper read, then a general discussion followed. In this manner views from all sides were given. All the delegates were practical irrigation men, hence the discussions were largely practical with but little theory.

In his closing address Mr. O'Donnell summed up the sense of the meeting as the best solution of all troubles in the slogan, "Get together and talk it over."

Judge J. B. Griffith went as a delegate from the Klamath Water Users Association, Project Manager Camp and Water Master Fry representing the government.

Yreka Basketball Team to Play Here

Will Contest With Quintet of Local High School at Pavilion Saturday Night—Girls to Play Also

Yreka vs. Klamath Falls will be the basketball card next Saturday evening at the pavilion. The Yreka team will arrive Friday evening by train.

This will be the third game with an outside team for the local school quintet. Lakeview and Merrill have been defeated by decisive scores by Klamath, but Yreka is reported to be a hard nut to crack. The California boys lost to Ashland high school by only a small margin in a recent game. The game starts at 8 o'clock, but will be preceded by a game between two girls' teams. Tickets are on sale at the Star drug store and at Underwood's drug store. If purchased before the game at one of these stores the tickets will cost 35 cents, but at the door the night of the game will cost 50 cents. Yreka is guaranteed \$100 for expenses, and this must be raised by the local school.

The Klamath county high school team will start February 10th on a northern trip to play Yreka two games, Ashland two, Grants Pass one. Very probably Roseburg, Oakland and Cottage Grove will be visited. The girls' team will go as far as Ashland with the boys.

GOVERNMENT MAY BUILD BIG PAPER MILL IS REPORT

PLANT WILL COST MILLION OR MORE
Although Government Will Use Less Paper Than Last Year, Cost Will Be \$1,000,000 More—Federal Trade Commission Will Investigate Advance of \$10 a Ton Over Cost Last Year.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—Commissioners Parry and Harris of the federal trade commission will go to Ottawa, Canada, to confer with Canadian officials regarding the action of Canada in fixing news print prices to publishers at a \$10 a ton increase over last year.

The commission will confer Friday in Chicago with paper manufacturers and publishers, and devise means for relieving the present serious situation.

Important developments that are expected to follow may delay the commission's report to congress. The government probably will build a \$1,000,000 paper manufacturing plant. It is declared here that despite the fact that specifications call for less paper than the government used last year, the paper will cost \$1,000,000 more than last year.

TRAMPS TO HOLD BIG CONVENTION

AMERICAN COUNCIL OF MIGRATORY WORKERS OF THE WORLD WILL GATHER AT BUFFALO TO TALK GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

CLEVELAND, Jan. 24.—On foot, by freight, and, maybe, by passenger coach, 200 delegates are heading for Buffalo to attend the national convention of the American Council of Migratory Workers of the World. In other words, the gentlemen tramps of America.

Murray Youts, national secretary, whose office is in Cleveland, explained today that it is impossible to fix the exact time for the convention. Uncertain arrival of delegates will determine the starting time. When they reach Buffalo the convention will begin. This probably will be within the next two weeks.

The council is working for government ownership of railroads, employment of the unemployed by the government on public improvements; free transportation of workmen to where needed; municipal ownership of food supply and cheap loans by the government.

NAVY MAY HAVE A STEEL PLANT

NEED OF PLANT TO SUPPLY THE NEEDS OF NAVY SHOWN BY UNDERBIDDING OF ENGLISH FIRM ON PROJECTILES

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 24.—The navy department is considering a federal steel plant to supply the needs of the navy, Secretary Daniels told the United Press today.

The recent underbidding by Hadfields of England for armor piercing projectiles has impressed the department with the need of a federal plant, Daniels said.
