Argentine May Be Put on "One Money" Basis

Argentine Now Has Two Kinds of Pecos of Different Values, But Plan is to Call in Paper Pecos and Establish One Standard.

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 25.—The plan suggested by Dr. de la Plaza, just retired as president of Argentina, for putting the republic on a "one money" basis, has not met with a very enthusiastic public reception. Some time ago the Argentines grew tired of transacting business in a depreciated and fluctuating paper currency. They accordingly took an accounting and found that they had enough gold on hand to redeem their outstanding paper issues at the rate of 44 cents on the dollar. A law was accordingly passed fixing 44 centavos as the legal value of a paper peso. A gold peso was worth 100 centavos, or the merest trifle less than \$1 United States money. Gold pesos were and still are so scarce, however, as to be practical curiosities. The gold to redeem the 44 centavo paper pesos was religiously kept at the Caja de Conversion, however, and whenever any more paper money was issued, a corresponding amount of gold was deposited in the caja. The result of this was to stop the fluctuation of Argentine money, but it left the country with two kind of pesos, at least nominally, gold and paper. It complicated bookkeeping and caused more other incidental inconveniences. Just before his term as president expired, Dr. de la Plaza sent a message to congress, saying he considered this a poor arrangement. He proposed that, as the 44 centavos paper pesos were out and were presented for redemption, in a volume sufficiently smaller to allow the gold reserve to still cover it. There were other incidental features to his plan, concerning coinage and various minor details, but essentially the scheme was to end the system of having two varieties of the same kind of money. The public view is that this would be a good thing in theory, but that it would cause more temporary inconvenience and confusion than the country likes to submit to. Furthermore, it is asserted that the change would unsettle prices for a long time, and that the consumer would get the worst of it. Congress has the matter still under consideration, but the plan has so many opponents that its adoption seems doubtful.

BRITISH PROTEST BUILDING A ROAD

FRANCE AND RUSSIA CAUSE CONFLICT BETWEEN AMERICAN FIRM AND CHINESE GOVERNMENT TO BE CHANGED

TOKIO, Jan. 23.—Because of protests raised by Great Britain, France and Russia, the railway loan contract signed September 30th between the Chinese government and the American firm of Siems & Carey, St. Paul, has been revised according to an official dispatch to the Japanese government. Four lines, all but the one connecting Yingchow with Lunchow in the island of Hainan, have been dropped from their original contract. It is reported. The line in Hainan Island and another of 800 miles, which is to connect Chucow, a town in Hunan province, with Chingchow, in Kwangtung, are given in the new contract. The amount of the loan is to be changed as a result of a change in the plans, says the dispatch received here. The new amount is to be decided after a survey by Mr. Kyle, engineer of the Siems-Carey company, who is now on his way to China. It is probable that the last proposed line between Chucow and Chingchow also may receive a protest from Great Britain and France, because of conflict with the Hankin-Hisengyi line and the Pekin-Hankow road, both under British interests. The French claim rights for lines from Yunnan to Chingchow and from Chingchow to Chungking.

MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 25.—Jurors in the Latah county district court object to getting "cricks in the joints" on account of having to sit on hard chairs while hearing cases. They complained to Judge Steele. He promised them swivel seats at the next term.

Five-Year-Old Boy Pilots His Blind Father 2,400 Miles



When Representative Schall of Minnesota decided to go to his home from Washington during the holidays, he needed some one to guide him, because he is blind. The job fell to his 5-year-old son, Thomas D. Jr. The boy can neither read nor write, yet he took the father to Minnesota and return with a mishap. When they sat down to dinner the boy spelled out the bill of fare, like, "S-T-E-A-K 7-5," and the father knew that meant 75 cents. When the father received change the boy called off to him the figures on bills and coins.

CUPID LOST IN FIGHT IN 1916

CALIFORNIA STATISTICS SHOW THAT FEWER MARRIAGES WERE SOLEMNIZED IN LEAP YEAR THAN IN 1915

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 25.—Cupid took an awful slump during the leap year just closed, according to the report of George D. Leslie, chief of the state bureau of vital statistics, made public today. In the three largest counties the number of marriages was less in 1916 than in 1915. Of the ten largest counties only five reported more marriages for 1916 than for 1915. The decrease of 836 in San Francisco is explained by the fact that the marriage total for the metropolis was exceptionally great in the exposition year.

SALEM, Jan. 25.—Closing a three day session, the fourteenth annual Oregon State Labor Convention will adjourn tonight. The 100 delegates are interested in the passage of a law consolidating the industrial accident commission and labor boards.

Sell Jackrabbit Skins
LAKEVIEW, Jan. 25.—Stories about jackrabbit pelts being worth real cash took concrete form today when ranchers learned that a St. Louis firm offered 15 to 18 cents a pound for such skins, according to quality. There is also a 5 cent bounty on the jacks in this county. Shipping pelts to St. Louis would cost 6 1/2 cents a pound.

STATE RECEIVES MUCH FOR AUTOS

LICENSE MONEY IN 1916 AMOUNTED TO \$110,232, AND COST OF AUTOMOBILE DEPARTMENT WAS \$20,211.55

A total of \$110,232 was received by the state during 1916 for Automobile, motorcycle and chauffeur registrations and for transfers and duplications, according to a report from Secretary of State Ben W. Olcott. During the year \$26,244.55 was spent by the state to maintain the automobile department. The difference of \$119,987.45 will be distributed among the several counties for road purposes. Klamath county will get \$2,393.49 of this.
