MAY BE WITHOUT PRESIDENT A DAY

UNITED STATES MAY HAVE NO EXECUTIVE OR CONGRESS ON MARCH 4TH, AS IT COMES ON SUNDAY THIS YEAR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—A nation without an executive, and without a legislative body, is what this United States may be March 4th, unless constitutional sharks trying to prevent it, succeed.

Sunday, March 4th, is the death day of the sixty-fourth congress and of President Wilson's first term.

Three precedents are found in American history—in 1821, 1849 and in 1877—for adjourning congress on March 3d, at noon, as Sunday fell on the 4th. No president is found for continuing its sessions until the fifth.

A resolution introduced by Senator Walsh, Montana, declares it is the sense of the senate that the present session expire on March 4, at noon. It has been referred to the senate judiciary committee. No decision has yet been reached as to when President Wilson and Vice President Marshall will take their oaths of office. Either could, if necessary, take it the third, or again, be sworn in on Sunday, the 4th, and again on Monday, as a "guarantee" against fault in doing it Sunday.

Constitutional experts say the oath administered on Sunday would be completely legal and binding.

PASTOR ASSAILED BY FALLEN GIRLS

WOMEN OF SAN FRANCISCO'S RESTRICTED DISTRICT ASK PASTOR WHAT HE AND COHORTS WILL DO FOR THEM

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—Three hundred women of San Francisco's underworld this afternoon marched to the Central Methodist church and handed to Rev. Paul Smith, its pastor, this question:

"What will the persons who are trying to close up the uptown tenderloin do to obtain employment for the women and girls deprived of the means of livelihood as a result of the crusade you are conducting?"

VOGELSANG SENDS NEW YEAR'S GREETINGS

WESTERN UNION OFFERS NOVELTY

HAS BOOKLET OF SUGGESTIONS FOR WORDING CONGRATULATORY TELEGRAMS AND MESSAGES OF CONDOLENCE

Frequently persons wishing to send a telegram of congratulation or of sympathy are troubled about the wording of the message. Often the telegraph managers are appealed to for suggestions, and the Western Union Telegraph company, observing this, has realized that the preparation of a collection of suggested forms for such messages would fill a real want. It has, therefore, issued a 24-page booklet containing suggestions for the wording of telegrams appropriate to New Year's Day, Easter, Thanksgiving Day, Christmas, birthdays, weddings, and new arrivals via the work route, messages of condolence and congratulatory messages to school or college graduates and to public men.

They are intended as suggestions only, and may be changed and modified according to individual taste and the exigencies of the particular occasion. The typographical arrangement is very attractive and altogether the pamphlet represents a rather novel departure in the way of an effort to be of assistance to the telegraph using public and should prove of use to many. OFFICERS LED BY MISSION WORKER RESCUE GIRL FROM CAPTIVITY IN SAN FRANCISCO'S CHINATOWN DISTRICT

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 25.—Jung Oy, a Chinese girl of 17 years, was rescued from captivity in Chinatown today by the police. The raid was led by Mrs. Donaldina Cameron of the Presbyterian mission.

The girl was found locked in a closet after the officers had chopped down the doors. Three Chinamen were arrested.

McAdoo says a good knowledge of Spanish is necessary if the United States hopes to successfully promote trade relations with Mexico and South American republics.

EXPLANATION OF LEAK IS GIVEN

HIGH OFFICIAL SAYS AMERICAN CODE IN WHICH MESSAGES ARE TRANSMITTED WAS KNOWN IN EUROPE

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 25.—Confidential messages from the state department leaked out because the American code was known abroad, a high official said today. The code has been altered since the peace note.

In view of the investigation of the most recent leak, the state department's admission appears significant.
