

INQUIRY ON LOSS OF SHIP STARTED

NAVAL BOARD BEGINS INVESTIGATION OF LOSS OF CRUISER MILWAUKEE TODAY—SAILORS WILL TESTIFY ON STRANDING

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 29.—The naval board of inquiry investigating the loss of the cruiser Milwaukee and the submarine H-3, started its hearings today on the cruiser Pueblo, anchored in the harbor.

Rear Admiral Pollam is presiding at the inquiry. Many of the sailors from the Milwaukee will be called in to testify.

The same board may open bids for the salvaging of the Milwaukee. This salvage work will include the construction of a railroad one mile long, from Samoa to the wreck, and a trestle to the stranded cruiser.

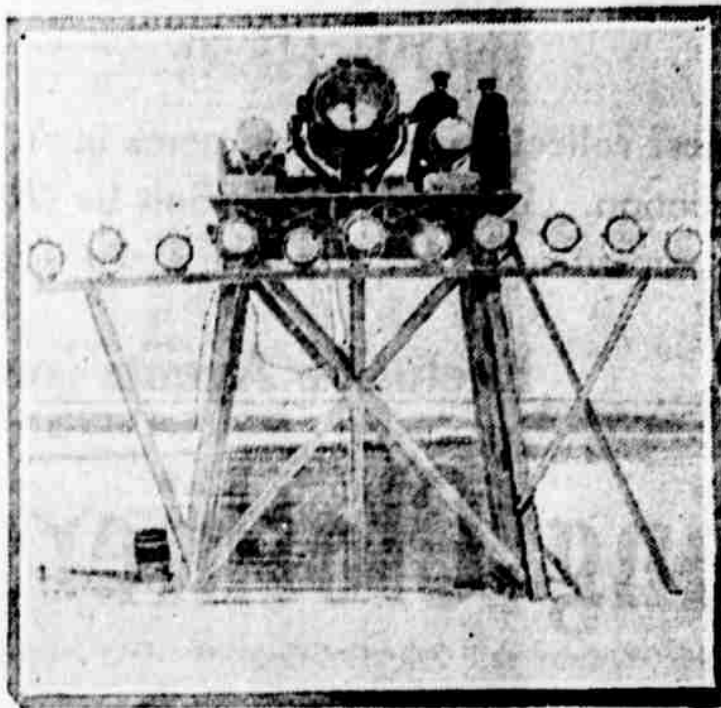
The Women's Club held an all-day meeting on Thursday of this week with Mrs. Alden Brooks.

Searchlights on Long Island to Keep Hostile Aeroplanes Away



A monster searchlight of 500,000-candlepower has been installed by the government on the aviation field at Hempstead, L. I., and it will shortly be put to tests to determine its worth as a "watchman" of our shores. Aviators will go up in biplanes, followed by "enemies." The

searchlight will then find the "enemies," and the other machines, hidden by darkness, will attack and destroy the enemies. The light has a radius of four miles, sufficient, it is believed, to pick out a machine and keep it within its arc, while anti-aircraft guns and aeroplanes pick it out and destroy it.

BIRTH CONTROL WOMAN UP AGAIN

MRS. SANGER AGAIN WILL BE TRIED ON CHARGES GROWING OUT OF BIRTH CONTROL CLINIC CONDUCTED BY HER

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Mrs. Margaret Sanger, New York's fighting, judge-defying birth control advocate, and her associate, Miss Fanny Mindell, will be tried today in special sessions on charges growing out of the maintenance of a birth control clinic by Mrs. Sanger in Brooklyn.

The defense intends making a strenuous effort to get the testimony of physicians into the case, saying the death rate among children ascends astonishingly with the increase in births per family. The defense is willing to attempt to prove from voluminous statistics that deaths per 1,000 births in families having less than three children is 108.5; three of four children 126; five or six children 152.8; seven or eight children 176.4; nine or more children 191.9.

As in the case of Mrs. Ethel Byrne, Mrs. Sanger's sister, who was convicted, and whose case is now on appeal, the defense will argue that birth control is not birth elimination, but merely voluntary motherhood.

Friends of Mrs. Sanger from all strata of society—furred women in limousines and the very poor—plan to give her their support.

New Berths for Naval Officers

CONFINED FORTY YEARS; NOW OUT

JESSE POMEROY, FOR 40 YEARS HELD IN SOLITARY CONFINEMENT, IS GIVEN PERMISSION TO SEE OTHERS

BOSTON, Jan. 29.—Jesse Pomroy, for over forty years confined in solitary confinement in the Charlestown state prison, and the most famous prisoner in the whole country, came out of his almost unbroken solitude today to spend the rest of his days in human association with other men, his fellow prisoners.

The governor's council voted to commute his sentence from solitary to life imprisonment.

For the first time since he entered solitary confinement as a boy of 16 to pay the penalty for a series of revolting murders and attacks on children that terrorized Boston nearly a half century ago, he was today allowed to talk and associate with his fellow prisoners.

man, nobly planned, to warn, to comfort, and command." "A form indeed, where every god did seem to set his seal, to give the world assurance of a man."

If you want to grow a strong and perfect body, you must cultivate it. The plant must have the right soil about its roots, and fresh air and sun light must bathe its leaves and branches. It must be watered by the rain and dew and fed with fertilizer. So our bodies must have the air to breathe and the food and water to build them up, to make good the constant waste that is a part of life.

Begin today to prepare. Take the thing that is the cheapest, the one commodity that is not monopolized, the thing that is so free and yet means so much—AIR. Remember first that you are a vertebrate; hence stand straight, walk straight, sit straight, and, I may add, talk straight and be straight. In this condition, load up on oxygen. Ventilate your lungs daily. Take this tip: The time to prevent tuberculosis is before it attacks you.
