Cost \$100,000,000 to Hunt Mexico's Bandit

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—With the hunt for Pancho Villa, the enchanted Captain, in its last chapter, it is estimated today that the unsuccessful search has cost between \$90,000,000 and \$102,000,000. The war department declares that perhaps half this sum would have been spent anyhow in maintaining General Pershing's army. Within ten days there will not be an American soldier south of the Mexican border. Shortly thereafter all militiamen will be sent home.

Dr. Orville E. McKim, a veterinarian of Watertown, N. Y., was one of the victims of the German raider which has terrorized the North and South Atlantic. He has shipped aboard the British steamer Georgia, and was among other Americans on her when she was attacked by the raider. Nothing has been heard as to his fate.

Banker Wants Lawson Arrested as Perjurer

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—After categorically denying that he had any peace note leak information from a cabinet member or slicing a leak pot with Secretary of the Treasury William G. McAdoo, Pliny Fisk suggested today to the house rules committee that Thomas W. Lawson be imprisoned as a perjurer. Fisk, formerly a partner with McAdoo, says he closed up McAdoo's business affairs when McAdoo joined President Wilson's cabinet. Since then, Fisk said, he has had no dealings with McAdoo.

ARTILLERY CORPS—SPECIAL

Wayne Winnings, a local boy, left yesterday morning for the Vancouver barracks to become a soldier in the United States army. He enlisted here last week under Sergeant W. D. Schuster, recruiting officer. He joined the coast artillery corps.

He returned Saturday highly pleased with the treatment received from the army officers in Portland and Vancouver. He says the boys training at the barracks are happy, and seem to be glad they enlisted.

According to Sergeant Schuster, there is a big demand just now by the army for musicians. Due to the increase in the strength of the regular army authorized by the act of congress approved June 13, 1916, from 1,500 to 3,000 additional musicians will be needed in the near future to supply the requirements of the additional army bands authorized.

VISITORS ARE STRONG IN FIRST
HAIF, BUT ARE COMPLETELY
OUTCLASSED IN LAST PERIOD
BY SUPERIOR TEAM WORK

By a score of 39 to 16, the Klamath county high school basketball team Saturday night defeated the Yreka high school quintet on the pavilion floor in one of the fastest games played here in some time.

Superior team work spelled victory for the local boys. At the end of the first half the score stood 11 to 9 for Yreka, but the second half had no more opened when Klamath started to do the job up brown. Basket after basket was made so quick Yreka could hardly realize what was going on.

Several times the ball was passed but twice after being thrown up at center before Jake Steiger had it in the basket.

Both teams showed speed and pep, but Yreka could not keep possession of the ball long enough to get a chance at field baskets.

On free throws after fouls, Yreka completely outclassed the Klamath team. The visitors converted most of their chances, while the local boys time after time failed to make the easy one point.
