Says Government Should Control Wireless Plants

Franklin D. Roosevelt Points Out Reasons Why Nation Should Be Able to Control New Means of Communication

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 2.—As a measure of safety the United States government should assume control of every wireless station in this country, except those engaged in purely ultra-state business at once.

Control of wires and cables is simple, but wireless messages are easily interfered with by outsiders. There should be government ownership of all wireless apparatus in peace as well as in war time, as a matter of public policy. We shouldn't let this matter wait until trouble is upon us.

The suggestion has been made to congress and is based fundamentally upon the character of wireless telegraphy. In land telegraph lines and submarine cables, each separate wire sends its own message and does not interfere with the sending of messages on other wires. The location and existence of these wires and cables is a matter which can be determined almost at a moment's notice. The control of these is an easy matter from the military or naval point of view.

Wireless is entirely different. The sending and receiving machinery is small and readily concealable, and the actual transmission of the message through the waves in the air. This means, of course, that interference between messages increases necessar-

ily with the number of messages sent unless a perfect system with a central control is initiated. The increase in the number of installations all over the United States has been greater than the development of science in respect to non-interference, and the result is growing confusion.

Quite aside from the general question of the advisability of establishing a government monopoly, the considerations in favor of government operation of wireless far outweigh any possible disadvantages.

Central control has been demonstrated to be a necessity; it cannot be carried out successfully except by actual government operation, and, more important still, the military and naval requirements are such that it would be unsafe, speaking in a broad sense, to wait until after a declaration of war before taking over or closing up hundreds and thousands of small individual, privately owned stations.

The only way by which real safety can be assured is for the government to exercise this control in times of peace also.
