Anti-Saloon League Predicts Dry United States in 1918

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 3.—That the entire United States will be voted dry by the end of 1917 was the prediction here today of the Anti-Saloon League of America. The claim is based on the following:

Pending dry legislation will be passed at the present session of congress, as a result of the "undisputed" growth of public sentiment in favor of it, and the 139 new house of representatives members will swell the ranks of the "197 members of the house who favored the Hobson na-

tional prohibition bill." Many of them, it is pointed out, have been elected from states which have recently "gone dry" or have declared their intention of so doing. Virginia, Alabama, Iowa, Nebraska and Michigan have adopted prohibition laws since the vote was taken in congress on the Hobson constitutional amendment bill.

"It is reasonable to assume the movement will have all the congressional votes of these states—a gain of fifteen."
