

Letter on Freight Rate Question is Received

California Commission Extends Effective Date of Their Order From February 4 to 19

The following letter has been received by Fred Fleet, secretary of the Klamath Commercial Club, from Y. R. Bishop, of the firm of Bishop & Sahler, traffic managers, of San Francisco, in regard to adjustment of the freight rates question before the California railroad commission.

The letter is as follows: "We are pleased to acknowledge receipt of your letter of February 1st, with reference to class rates from California points to Klamath Falls, and in reply will state that we have just received a notice from the railroad commission of the state of California, extending the effective date of their order from February 4 to February 19, 1917, from which it would appear that the commission will very likely get this case for a rehearing, in compliance with the petition filed for that purpose by the Southern Pacific Company. It may be possible, however, that the commission will deny this application and order the rates effective February 19th.

"There is nothing that we can do just at this time to hasten the publication of the new rates, but we will keep in close touch with proceedings and advise you promptly of anything that may occur in connection there-

with. We are very much in hopes that the adjustment would have been finally disposed of long before this time, but as you can well appreciate, it is one of those things that must take its course."

SAN FRANCISCO BAY

IS CLOSELY GUARDED

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 7.—The San Francisco bay district is under a guard, awaiting the next turn of the international wheel at Washington. Out in the bay four United States torpedo boat destroyers are at anchor, ready to act on orders from the navy department. Mare Island navy yard was a beehive of activity, and repairs were being rushed on all vessels in dock there to the end that they may be put into service quickly should they be needed by the government.
