Secretary McAdoo Tells New Silver Coins History

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 8.—Secretary McAdoo has announced the adoption of new designs for the half dollar, quarter and dime. The first of the new coins was struck shortly after July 1, 1916, the beginning of the fiscal year. The new half dollar and dime were designed by Adolph A. Weinman, and the quarter dollar by Hermon A. MacNeil.

Under the laws governing the coinage of the United States, the designs and devices on any new coin may not be changed within twenty-five years after the adoption of the existing ones. The emblems now in use on the

half dollar, quarter and dime were adopted in 1891.

The law prescribes that the changing of designs on coins shall be supervised by the director of the mint and approved by the secretary of the treasury. The selection of the new designs has required a good deal of patience and care, owing to the universal interest in the subject and its historical importance.

Several sculptors were commissioned to submit sets of sketch models. From more than fifty of these models Secretary McAdoo and Director Woolley selected three sets, and in this a radical departure has been made, as heretofore the obverse side of the half dollar, quarter and dime have always carried the same design, an emblem symbolic of liberty, and the reverse of the half dollar and quarter dollar, an eagle of the same design. Only the reverse of the dime has been different. Director Woolley suggested varying the designs in order that the half dollar might be given more individuality and thus restore its waning popularity. Strange to say, it has practically fallen into disuse.

The design of the dime, owing to the smallness of the coin, has been held quite simple. The obverse shows a head of Liberty with winged cap. The head is firm and simple in form, the profile forceful. The reverse shows a design of the bundle of sticks, with battle axe known as "fasces," and symbolical of unity, wherein lies the nation's strength. Surrounding the fasces is a full foliaged branch of olive, symbolical of peace.

Mr. MacNeil, the designer of the quarter dollar, was born in Chelsea, Mass., in 1866. He was a pupil of Chapu at Julien academy, and of Falguere at Ecole des Beaux Arts; taught three years at Cornell and three years at Art Institute, Chicago; did important decorative work at Chicago, Paris and Buffalo exhibitions; executed "Coming of the White Man" at City Park, Portland, Ore.; the McKinley memorial at Columbus, Ohio; Soldiers and Sailors monument at Washington Park, Albany, N. Y.; the Orville Hitchcock Platt memorial at Hartford, Conn., and many other pieces of sculpture.

Mr. Weinman, the designer of the fifty cent piece and the ten cent piece, was born at Karlsruhe, Baden, Germany, in 1876. He attended the public schools of New York and Cooper Institute. He was a pupil of Martini, August St. Gaudens, O. L. Warner,

TWO STREAMS CLOSED SOON

ORDER FROM STATE COMMISSION CLOSES PARTS OF KLAMATH RIVER AND SPENCER CREEK TO PROTECT FISH

The waters of the Klamath River and Spencer Creek within certain boundaries are closed to fishermen for a period of four months, from February 15, 1917, to June 15, 1917, according to a communication received from the state Fish and Game Commission.

These streams are closed to protect the trout and other fish, the commission states. It shall be unlawful to take or fish for trout, and anyone violating the order will be prosecuted.

The order includes the following portions of these streams: All of the Klamath River from a point 300 feet below the lowermost portion of the confluence of the Klamath River and Spencer Creek, to a point 200 feet above the uppermost portion of these streams.

On Spencer Creek, all that portion and its tributaries between the confluence of Spencer Creek and a point on Spencer Creek 500 feet above the county road across the creek, on or adjacent to the property leased by the state for the hatchery.
