IRRIGATION BILL IS CONSIDERED

LOCAL PERSONS INTERESTED IN ATTEMPT TO PUT IRRIGATION WORK ON ITS FEET IN TOUCH DELEGATION AT SALEM

Local parties interested in irrigation in Klamath county are endeavoring to straighten out a muddle in irrigation laws caused at a recent session of the legislature, according to L. W. Mohaffey of this city.

An irrigation bill passed in 1911 was repudiated in some respects by a bill passed in 1915. Work done under the 1911 act and since the 1915 act was passed is said to be illegal, and unless some change is made the law is void, and will have to be done over.

To prevent this another bill to be introduced through this part of the state's delegation at Salem to rectify and straighten out the tangle, so that irrigation work can be carried on without a cloud hanging over its head, according to Mr. Mohaffey.

to the supreme officers for further investigation and examination. If approved there, the charter will be issued and the council later instituted. In speaking of the order, Mr. Barrett said:

"The Knights of Columbus was started in 1883, the principal object being the carrying into effect among the laymen the beautiful truths of our faith. Today, notwithstanding the rigorous restrictions that must be passed to secure admission, the order has grown to a membership of over 271,000. Ridiculous charges have been made against the Knights of Columbus, but these find no lodgment in the minds of the intelligent people of the nation. If a council is instituted in Klamath Falls, it will be a distinct advantage to the city, and will soon become one of the effective and beneficial aids to its upbuilding and development."
