"The Tragedy of Lawlessness"

Human life is filled with surprises, and doubtless eternity will be full of surprises. One of the great surprises of heaven will be that many will be there we did not expect to see; another will be that some will be absent we were sure we would meet; but the chief surprise will be that we ourselves are there.

In the sixty minutes just passed this world has rolled on its axis and carried us some 700 miles in the arc of a circle which is 17,000 miles in circumference. During the same sixty minutes this world has rushed along its invisible race course around the sun a distance of 68,000 miles. It has been in the arc of a circle about 200,000,000 miles in diameter, a circle so vast that the world drops but one-eighth of an inch from a straight line in twenty miles. And during the same sixty minutes this world has sped onward with the solar system and has followed the sun 200,000 miles in its journey through space toward the constellation Hercules. Thus have we journeyed this Sabbath morning in a single hour about 268,700 miles, not in three directions, but in a spiral path in the abyss of immensity—yet without jar, or alarm, or thought of danger. It is because the universe is under the reign of law—God's law.

Tremendous forces beat upon us every day, yet we dwell peacefully among them. The atmosphere weighs five quadrillions of tons, and has a pressure of fifteen pounds to the square inch at sea level; yet our bodies are so adjusted to it we are unharmed. The world is a gigantic magnet which is in constant electrical communication with the sun; but the air is so good a non-conductor of electricity that we are not destroyed. Waves of heat beat upon the world from the sun, which is a stupendous furnace, heated to some 14,000 degrees. The heat radiated from a square yard of the sun's surface equals the heat of six tons of coal burned in an hour; and yet this terrible heat is so diffused by the atmosphere as to promote the kingdoms of life on the earth. Light from the sun pours upon the world with a pressure of 75,000 tons, and a velocity of 190,000 miles in a second of time; yet the tiniest insect is not retarded in its flight nor its gauzy wings broken. The sun holds the world in its mighty grasp of gravitation. It holds the world in its elliptical orbit and prevents it from flying off in a tangent into space. How vast is that power, when we remember the earth weighs some 6,000 billion billion tons, and travels eighteen miles in a second. And so we live daily amid great forces of heat, light, motion, electricity and chemical affinity, but there is such a correlation and conservation of forces, and such a harmonious method of operation that life thrives and prospers.

But notice this. The obedience of the living kingdoms to the reign of law, seen in the functions of physical organisms, the call of instinct, the voice of reason, or the impulse of conscience, is the price of life and welfare in the world. Behold the world with its teeming population of 100,000 species of plants, 386,000 species of animals, and million species of microscopic life, yet thriving and perpetuated amid a great variety of conditions—and all because obedient to the behests of law.

But very often in the operation of natural laws of life is lost and property destroyed. Earthquake, tidal wave, devouring flame, and rending thunderbolt have wrought havoc; but the damage done has been small indeed compared with the good accomplished by these forces of nature. What would the world be, if deprived of the power of steam, even though some boilers have exploded; and though the majestic Titanic was hurled to destruction with sixteen hundred lives in collision with an iceberg, and all because somebody violated the law of caution? What would the world be without the law of combustion, even though fire does burn a forest or destroy a city? What would society do if the laws of electricity and magnetism were annulled, even though some loss follows human carelessness and ignorance? The great forces of nature have bowed to the behest of man, and become his servants. Without them the doors of progress must have remained closed, and mankind must be unable to rise above the station of the brute, or above the law of natural selection.

However, if men ignorantly or wilfully violate the laws of caution, of reason, and self preservation; if they insist on living at the foot of a volcano, or in the arid desert; if they violate the laws of reason and experience, they must expect to bear the consequences of collision with the laws of nature. Recall the terrible disasters of history, paint the picture as black as you will, it only teaches us a valuable lesson. It is this: If collision with the natural laws spells disaster and death, how terrible must be collision with God's holy moral laws: "Evil shall slay the wicked."
