BATTLE FOR REWARD NOW

FOLLOWING THE CONVICTION OF MOONEY AT SAN FRANCISCO, A FIGHT FOR \$17,000 REWARD MONEY NOW PROMISES

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—A big legal battle is predicted for the \$17,000 rewards offered after the fatal preparedness parade dynamiting, for which Thomas Mooney was sentenced to death last week.

Chief White has announced that no reward will be paid. It is reported that Chief Conra of Sacramento has claimed the whole reward because he furnished information which led to the apprehension of the indicted men.

Israel Weinburg, another of the defendants in the case, is to be tried within a month.

Rob Safe in San Jose.
SAN JOSE, Calif., Feb. 13.—Three masked robbers blew two safes in the San Jose railroad company's office this morning and escaped with \$500 cash, after binding up five car barn employes and putting them in a street car. It is believed the robbers fled toward San Francisco. The robbers jestingly told their prisoners they wanted the money for the defense of Mooney, convicted bomb planter.

Wheat Takes Drop.
CHICAGO, Feb. 13.—Because freight conditions here are so congested that it is impossible to ship grain, five huge elevators were closed today, causing a sharp break in wheat prices. Six other elevators are expected to close soon.

Capture Many Italians.
BERLIN, Feb. 13.—The Germans have stormed and captured the heights east of Paralovo, Macedonia, capturing many Italian prisoners, it is announced. Another position, Valchutina, Koumanla, has also been stormed.
