MAKE PLANS FOR COAST'S DEFENSE

MEETING TO BE HELD AT LOS ANGELES TO FORMULATE PLANS FOR ENTIRE PACIFIC COAST PROTECTION

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—A plan for permanent preparedness will be outlined at a meeting of business men at the Hotel Alexandria here tonight. The plan will be suggested to other cities of the Pacific Coast, in an endeavor to have it adopted as a coast-wide scheme.

Under the plan as outlined today, 250,000 men would be organized for the defense of the Pacific Coast. In time of peace it is proposed that these men would be used by the government in reclamation and harbor improvement work, paying them regular wages.

A committee of public safety would be organized in Los Angeles to assume control of affairs in an emergency. The plan also contemplates the establishment of a military school.

Just how all these results will be obtained hasn't been revealed. A committee of 100 is supposed to be working out the scheme quietly. They may reveal a lot of details tonight.

MANY AIGRETTES TAKEN BY OFFICER

COLLECTOR OF CUSTOMS AT LOS ANGELES HAS DESTROYED 134 AND EVIDENCE SHOWS MANY ATTEMPTS TO SMUGGLE

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—Within a few months, Collector of Customs John B. Elliott has seized and destroyed 134 aigrettes, besides the feathers of a number of other wild birds, according to a report just made public. This report indicates that attempts to smuggle plumage into the United States are much more common than is generally supposed.

"The importation of all wild bird plumage into the United States is forbidden," said Collector Elliott. "The aigrettes are smuggled across the border by the Cocopah Indians, who kill the female herons on the delta of the Lower Colorado River. While the female bird is nesting they approach and hit her on the head. Some people claim that with the mother bird dead, the young in the nest die. Others, however, claim that the male bird takes up the work of feeding until the young are ready to leave the nest."

ASHLAND MAY BUY BIG PARK

MASS MEETING CALLED FOR FEBRUARY 15 TO DISCUSS PROPOSITION OF CITY BUYING CHAUTAUQUA GOUNDS FOR \$15,000

ASHLAND, Feb. 14.—The proposal of the city to buy the park lands here from the Southern Oregon Chautauqua Association for \$15,000, which money the association will use in the erection of a new auditorium this spring, will be submitted to the voters of Ashland. A mass meeting has been called for February 15 to discuss the proposition. The new Chautauqua building for the 1917 assembly is also to be used for a civic auditorium, and will have a capacity of 5,000.

Commemorate Blowing Up of Maine
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Memories of the blowing up of the battleship Maine in Havana harbor and the wave of patriotic resentment that swept the United States from Florida to the Pacific, will be recalled here tonight, when the Naval and Military Order of the Spanish War, assembled at the Army and Navy Club at its annual dinner, commemorating the anniversary of the event. The banquet was somewhat lacking in its usual brilliancy owing to the recent death of Admiral Dewey.

First American Vessel to Be Sunk in Sub War



The sinking of the American steamship Housatonic off the Scilly Islands, Saturday, February 3, is the first overt act against the United States committed since the German declaration of the new ruthless submarine warfare. It is believed now, however, that Germany complied with the international law. This quotation from the president's address to congress

delivered shortly after the vessel was sunk, bears on the case:

"If this inveterate confidence on my part in the sobriety and prudent foresight of their purpose should unhappily prove unfounded, if American ships and American lives should in fact be sacrificed by their naval commanders in heedless contravention of the just and reasonable understanding

of international law and the obvious dictates of humanity, I shall take the liberty of coming again before the congress, to ask that authority be given me to use any means that may be necessary for the protection of our seamen and our people in the prosecution of their peaceful and legitimate errands on the high seas. I can do nothing less."

CRATER VISITORS WILL BE WELCOME

CRATER LAKE PARK TO BE PLAYGROUND FOR PEOPLE, WITH BEST OF SERVICE IS POLICY OF NEW SUPERVISOR

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—"The policy at Crater Lake will be to make visitors welcome, to make them feel they are welcome, and to give the best service possible. It belongs to the people, and it should be made in fact a playground for the people." George E. Goodwin, the new supervisor of Crater Lake National Park, thus stated his outstanding view of his work just before leaving Washington for Oregon. He has been for some time in consultation with officers of the interior department. He has been in the government service about fifteen years, and for four years has been engineer in charge of the road building in the park.

He will remain in charge of the road work, and the appointment of supervisor adds the administrative work of the park to his duties. About forty-five miles of the sixty-mile system of roadways has been completed. The new sundry civil bill, if it follows the estimates submitted to congress, will carry \$75,000 for work this year on the roads and \$67,890 more for other improvements, such as telephone system, trails, cabins, water supply and administrative buildings.

Will C. Steel, who resigned as supervisor, is now park commissioner. His duties are judicial, and are under the department of justice.

Western Lumbermen Meet
SPOKANE, Feb. 14.—Six hundred lumbermen of Washington, Idaho, California, Oregon, Montana, Utah, Nevada, Colorado, Wyoming and Arizona gathered here today for the annual convention of the Western Retail Lumbermen's Association. The proceedings will last three days. Matters of importance to the world's lumber market are to be discussed.

Report Favorable on Sinsott Bill
WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 14.—Facing the practical certainty that there will be no water power legislation at this session of congress, Congressman Sinsott, by authority of the house committee on public lands, has favorably reported his bill to permit entries on lands withdrawn for power purposes.

The Sinsott bill is identical with section 10 of the Ferris bill. It was held up in committee as long as hope remained for passage of general water power legislation. When that hope could no longer be indulged, the Sinsott bill was reported, but with somewhat slim prospects that at such a late date it will be able to make its way through the houses.
