MODOC COUNTY TALKS IRRIGATION

APPLICATION MADE TO USE 100,000 ACRE FEET OF WATER OF
ASH CREEK FOR \$275,000 PRO-
JECT ON 30,000 ACRES

ALTURAS, Feb. 22.—The application of Frank M. Mott, former mayor of Oakland, to the state water commission for permission to appropriate 100,000 acre feet of the waters of Ash Creek, this county, tributary to Pit River, and build what is known as the Round Valley reservoir, has created big interest in this county.

The cost of this project, the application says, will be \$275,000, and the reservoir will irrigate 30,000 acres.

This project has been long talked of both by the government and large private interests. The carrying out of this project would mean a great deal to Big Valley, which would be watered by it, and would mean the purchasing by the Frank M. Mott company of valuable farming property in Round Valley, which would be inundated by the waters of the proposed Round Valley reservoir.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 22.—President Wilson has practically determined to address congress on the German situation next week. Unless the situation takes a more critical turn the president will merely ask broad powers to "protect American rights" after congress adjourns.
