NEW COURSES AT UNIVERSITY

MARKETING METHODS AND BALANCE SHEET WORK TAUGHT. BROADENING SCOPE OF THE COMMERCE DEPARTMENT

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 27.—In pursuance of Dean D. W. Morton's policy of continually broadening the field of usefulness of the university school of commerce to the people of Oregon, two courses have been added to the curriculum of the school. These are the marketing methods and the study of balance sheets, both of which are taught by Professor J. H. Jackson.

Twenty-five students are enrolled in the balance sheet course, which has been made practical through the cooperation of several large Eastern business houses. These firms are sending their sheets to the school, where they are audited, then sent back to the business houses for check by experts.

The course in marketing is open to freshmen. More than 145 students in the University have selected commerce as their major subject.

Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover, and shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond payable to Klamath County, or a certified check made payable to the county clerk of said county, for an amount equal to at least 5 per cent of the amount of the bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond, or check is enclosed therewith. Security Bond

A corporate security bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in a sum equal to one-half of the total amount bid.

Plans may be seen and forms of the specifications and contract may be secured at the county clerk's office, court house, Klamath Falls, Oregon, or at the office of county surveyor.

Plan Deposit

A deposit of \$5.00 will be required for plans and specifications. Deposit will be returned to each bona fide bidder.
