German Raider Photographed Through Porthole



This photograph shows the strange Norfolk, Va., for Italy, with a cargo of coal December 5th. The picture was taken by Guy B. Van Dorn of Columbus, Ohio., who shipped on the St. Theodore. She was held up December 12th, and was turned into a raider. Later Van Dorn was taken aboard the raider and then landed at Pernambuco. It is not known if the raider is still free. There have been reports of the sinking of the vessel by British men of war at different times, but none of them have been verified.

Fur-Farming Good
Opening Says Stone

Member of State Fish and Game Commission Says He Contemplated Going Into Business Here

That fur farming on the slopes of the Cascades in Klamath county is an industry that is feasible, one that should be taken up and fostered, and is one that will net the pioneer in the business good money, is the belief of Chas. F. Stone, local attorney, and member of the State Fish and Game commission.

"This idea is not entirely new to me, for I attempted a few years ago to interest a second party in this thing, with the idea of going into partnership with him on a fur farming plan."

"It appears to me that Klamath county is the most ideally located spot for this that can be found. Fur farming has been made a prosperous industry in Alaska, but I believe that Klamath county is better fitted for this than Alaska."

"Our winters are cold enough and long enough to make this work feasible, and to make possible the raising of fine furred animals for their skins. There is plenty of land in this country and the Cascade section of the county for such an industry, and the land can be secured from the government very reasonably, for little or no cost to one desiring to use it for this purpose."

"I would certainly like to see some one take up this proposition and experiment it through. I believe there would be good money in it, and it will probably become a live industry in this region in time to come," said Mr. Stone.

The government is doing some work in this line in various parts of the country at this time, but is really only getting started, according to R. A. Ward, government biologist here.

At present it is specializing in fox farming in the northeastern part of the United States.

It was very evident that Evangelist Tupper had no speculative theory in his chart talk at the Gospel hall last night.

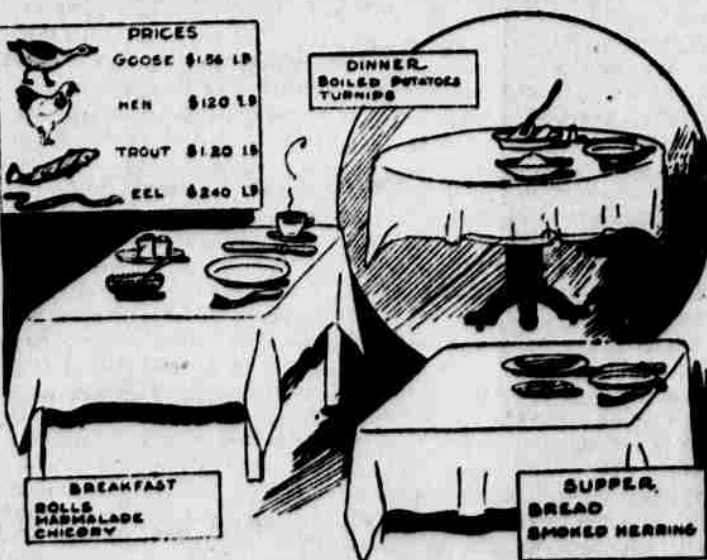
He read from Dan. 8:20-21, that the ram Media and Persia and the goat Grecia and the notable horn between his eyes, the first king, or Alexander the Great.

What the Germans Have to Eat



Facts and figures about food conditions in Germany illustrated in this drawing were taken from the report of a thorough investigation by a correspondent of the Associated Press. The German breakfast ration, controlled by the government, consists of two rolls, some marmalade (usually made from pumpkins) and a mixture of roasted grains and chicory, which goes under the name of coffee. The mid day dinner consists of boiled potatoes and some vegetables, usually turnips. The supper consists of bread and smoked herring, but the herring is not permitted every day. These diets are varied with eggs, one egg being permitted every two weeks for a time, and meat, which is permitted occasionally. The prices of meats, poultry and fish are very high.

BRYAN PACIFIST
WHILE NO WAR

WILLIAM JENNINGS WILL SUPPORT PORT ADMINISTRATION IF WAR DECLARED, BUT INHIBITS ON REFERENDUM VOTE

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 1.—William Jennings Bryan will support the administration if war is declared, he told the United Press today.

But until war comes, "peace will have no more ardent champion," he said. He insisted that a referendum vote should be taken to decide upon a course to pursue.

He wants any action that congress may take to bluntly show the president that he is not authorized either to declare war or "begin war."
