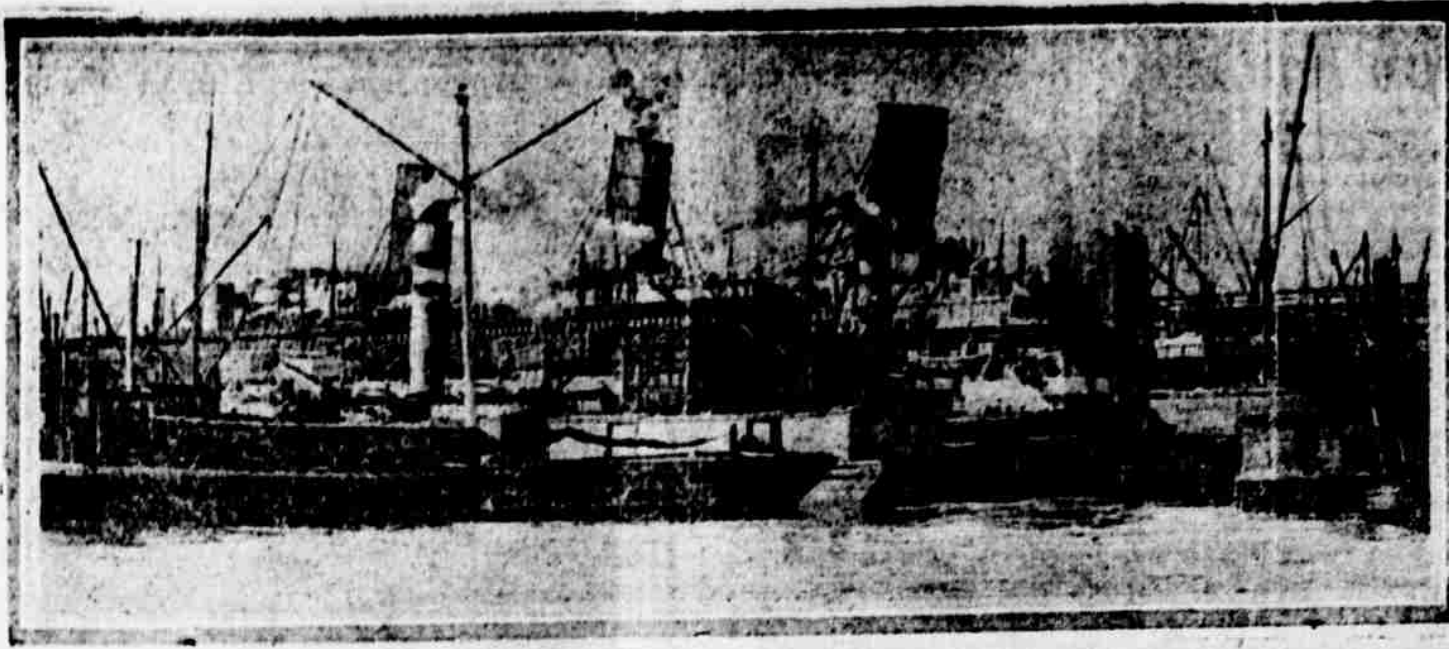

Klamath—A Rich Region

Let us labor to encourage industry and enterprise and increase the products of ingenuity and skill.

As the great struggle for wealth and power, happiness and prosperity wages with increased vigor, and as the necessities of life soar higher and higher, and the demands for our products grow greater and greater, and the flow of golden coins into our banks continues with ever increasing momentum.

The only solution of the great problem is to increase the production. It has been definitely ascertained by those in possession of expert knowledge that our production is not keeping pace with the demands of these strenuous times, our exports are now in excess of our imports millions monthly, not annually, and there still would be a market for all of our products were they doubly increased. Notwithstanding the fact that the opportunities for large profits has stimulated the activity of the entire nation, the report of the Department of Agriculture will show a great crop depletion for the year of 1916, it will show a decrease of 73,666,000 bushels of potatoes less than our 1915 crop, or a decrease of over 15 per cent. The shortage of our corn crop amounted to 471,294,000 bushels, or over 3 per cent less than our 1917 crop. The reports of our wheat production will show a shrinkage of over 371,699,000 bushels less than the

A Virginia Hero Back From Trenches



Mark Alexander, aged 31, of Roonoke, Va., is back from the Dardanelles minus two hands and an eye, but King George of England pinned on his breast a medal of honor, and he has been recommended for the Victoria Cross. While in a trench in the Dardanelles with six men he had lifted a hand bomb to throw. At that instant a Turkish bullet struck the bomb, exploding it. Alexander's hands were blown off and one eye was destroyed. Even then he stamped on the bomb with his feet to save his comrades. After eleven months he left the hospital. But the British government did not fail to recognize that kind of heroism.

1915 crop. The report is similar from cotton to corn. This condition is due in part, but not entirely, to the lack of adequate fertilization of the soil and the termination of our importations of potash from Germany for soil reconstruction has been a potent factor. For many decades the farmers of our country have been slowly but surely impoverishing our soil, and only within recent years has any attention been given to proper soil reconstruction.

The burning of the cotton and the corn stalks and wheat stubble to expedite the planting of another crop has been a disastrous and a fatal error. The danger of crop failures as a result of our inability to secure commercial fertilizer in sufficient quantities were directed to the attention of congress and to the nation by Congressman Hutchison of New Jersey, on April 26, 1916. Although an Atlantic coast state man, he is the most active and diligent advocate of the development of the Pacific kelp or potash industry to be found. Such unselfish and intelligent efforts as secure to him the distinction of being an American statesman rather than a congressman from the state of New Jersey. The nation and the Pacific coast states can well afford to develop this dormant industry. It would be highly beneficial to the American farmer and chemical manufacturer; it would be another link in our preparedness scheme. It would mean millions to our Pacific coast cities, and would contribute to the virility of the entire nation. If there is one spot in America that has suffered little or no effects of the great war, if there is one spot on earth that will never suffer from the lack of the application of commercial fertilizer, that favored clime is Klamath county.

Klamath county will ever be a prosperous community for the very reason that its principal industry is and ever will be the raising of livestock. This fact secures to this locality fertility of the soil for all time to come. The farmers of this community, by the maintaining of livestock on their farms, are assured of the best and most economic system of soil fertilization known to mankind. The judicious system of always maintaining a herd of livestock on the farm, whether sheep or cattle, or both, has secured happiness, prosperity and soil fertility to England, Scotland, Ireland and Switzerland for ages. The great parks of London are said to maintain more sheep than are to be found in many of the great agricultural districts of our country. The livestock industry thrives and prospers in England and other countries of the old world, regardless of their high rental and land values. The farmer of the old school and the modern agriculturist who locates in Klamath county will naturally engage to some extent in the most solid and stable of all industries, the growing of livestock. The merchant or investor who invades this region will have his investments backed up by a community engaging in an industry which has never since the dawn of civilization failed to liberally compensate those who have applied energy and intellect to their labors. The great war has taught us many lessons. It has taught us the value of soil reconstruction. It has directed our attention to the millions in wealth lying idle in our ocean waters. It has directed our attention to the fact that he whose hand placed the pebble on the shore and the islands in the sea was especially thoughtful and solicitous of those who inhabit this rich and romantic land, by surrounding them with so many opportunities for the acquisition of wealth. The development of the kelp beds on our coast and the development of resources of Klamath county will each be the moulding of another link in the golden chain of national prosperity, and those who are the postmasters of the day when the star of Western prosperity and development shall reach the zenith of its resplendent glory will receive the applause of every serious minded citizen, because they will be entitled to it.

BRITISH LIST DEAD IS LOW

LIST FOR FEBRUARY SHOWS 8000 KILLED AND 12,000 WOUNDED. ONE OF LOWEST ANY MONTH SINCE WAR STARTED

LONDON, March 1.—The British casualty list for February show that 8,000 were killed and 12,000 wounded on the various war fronts.

This is one of the lowest casualty lists for any month since the war began, despite the fact that large British gains have been made in France and that Kutelamara, the Turkish fortress, has been recaptured.
