SAID CATFISH IN UPPER LAKE

STATE FISH COMMISSIONER C. F. STONE SAYS CATFISH PLANTED IN ASPEN LAKE BY PRIVATE PARTIES NOW REPORTED—

Reports have reached this city that fishermen have been catching catfish in Upper Klamath Lake, and since these fish are foreign to this lake and have never been planted therein, has caused some speculation as to their origin. Fears have also been expressed for the safety of the trout in the lake and the mountain streams and rivers flowing into the lake.

It is stated by L. A. Will of the postoffice force, and corroborated by Chas. F. Stone, member of the State Fish and Game commission, that the catfish were placed in Aspen Lake about ten years ago by private parties. It is believed they have gone into the Upper Lake through Dry Rick Creek, which at certain times of the year is very high, and connects with Aspen Lake.

This is further substantiated by the fact that a number of catfish have been caught in the vicinity of the mouth of this creek, near the Doak ranch.

The catfish is not injurious to the trout, and will not harm them, taken either internally or externally, says Mr. Stone. It has been said that the trout go into this bay when feeding, and eat the small catfish, it being feared that the small horns on their heads would kill the trout.

Mr. Stone says that this is not the case, and that they will digest these fish, horns and all, as easily as they do hornets, and many other forms of animal life which might be thought injurious. Mr. Stone says that after finding the number of things he has in the stomach of trout, he does not fear that the catfish will injure them.

TWO LOCAL BANKS ANNOUNCE CHANGE

BEGINNING TODAY WILL HERE-AFTER MAKE CHARGES FOR WORK HITHERTO DONE FOR NOTHING
