KLAMATH HI AND ASHLAND DEBATE

MEET HERE IN HOUSTON OPERA HOUSE NEXT FRIDAY NIGHT TO DECIDE CHAMPIONSHIP OF SOUTHERN OREGON DISTRICT

The Ashland and the Klamath County high school debating team will meet in this city Friday night, March 9th, this week, for the championship of the South Central and the Southern Oregon districts of the Oregon State Debating League.

The debate will be held in Houston's opera house. A special musical chorus of ten high school girls will be directed by Professor M. S. Taylor of the high school music department, and other special musical numbers are being provided.

The Klamath team will have the negative side of the question. This team won a unanimous victory over Lakeview on the affirmative side. The members of the team are Miss Emma Honsik and Miss Beatrice Henaley. Coach Read Bain is predicting a hard battle for this team.

The question for debate is, "Resolved. That Oregon should adopt a health insurance law involving the essential features of the standard act of the American Association of Labor Legislation."

The judges will be Dean H. D. Sheldon of the department of education of the University of Oregon, Homer Billings of Ashland, and Fred Peterson of this city.

HI JOHNSON IS REMARKABLE MAN

LEAVES HERITAGE WHEN HE STEPS FROM GUBERNATORIAL CHAIR OF LONG PROGRAM OF PROGRESSIVE LEGISLATION

SACRAMENTO, March 6.—With the departure of Hiram Johnson from the governor's chair here to don his senatorial toga in Washington, there steps into national officialdom one of California's most remarkable men; and one who has been a national figure for several years.

Perhaps no more significant characterization of the man could be given than the fact that he leaves as the heritage of his years as governor, a long program of fulfilled progressive legislation and a thoroughly progressive legislature in this once boss-ridden state, to carry into effect more of the people's progressive ideas.

When William D. Stephens steps into the California gubernatorial shoes that Johnson vacates he will have behind him a legislature so strongly progressive that he will probably have little difficulty carrying out the policies inaugurated by Johnson.

The business of approving or vetoing measures passed by the present session of the legislature will fall to Stephens.

BARGAIN SALE FOR SPORTSMEN

SALE IS ON FROM THIS TIME ON UNTIL MAY 21 AT COUNTY CLERK'S OFFICE FOR HUNTING AND ANGLING LICENSES ONLY

Hunting and angling licenses at bargain sale—from now until May 21 at the county clerk's office. This is a result of an announcement made by State Game Warden Shoemaker of Roseburg.

The new law increasing the license fee becomes effective on that date, but does not deprive the sportsman from doing his 1917 rod and gun stunts under the old rate if he hurries. The present rate for either hunting or fishing licenses are \$1 per year, while \$2 is the rate for combination hunting and fishing license. After May 21 the rate will be \$1.50 for single licenses and \$3 for the combination.

More licenses have been sold during February than during the same month last year by between 1,200 and 1,500. It is expected that the revenues of the fish and game commission from this source will be materially larger than last year.

MARSHALL FIFTH TO SUCCEED SELF

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 6.—For but the fifth time in the history of the United States, a vice president was inaugurated to succeed himself, when Thomas J. Marshall, Indiana, yesterday subscribed to the oath of office as President Wilson's second in command.

But four other vice presidents have ever been chosen for a second term of office. They were John Adams, first vice president; George Clinton, under Presidents Jefferson and Madison; Daniel Tompkins, under President Monroe; and John C. Calhoun, under Presidents John Quincy Adams and Andrew Jackson, who resigned to enter the senate following his re-election.

Angles of the School Site

Some of us, on further consideration, are doubtful as to the wisdom of purchasing blocks 45 and 50, in Nichols Addition, for new school site. Let's analyze the matter pro and con. Let it be admitted that the present Central school grounds are rather small—such is the case with many schools. It may not be ideal. There is danger from passing autos, but we are constrained to say that drivers are far more careful and watchful on Main street than on the side streets paralleling the site proposed. Eleventh street will be the main artery for jitneys, motorcycles and trucks, often driven at reckless speeds and in great numbers. As to future prices, residence property is now high—the advance will not be great. Property can be condemned when the need arises. We are told that another site only about two blocks distant can be secured for about half the amount asked for the proposed site, and less objectionable to adjoining owners.

Many of our citizens are "loaded to the guards" with taxes at present, and are not in position to bear any additional burdens unless unavoidable. The city by large vote decided to try to better the conditions by railroad construction, and are sacrificing and denying themselves to make good. We hope for the best. Taxes now are nearly four per cent; next year, without additional burdens, the city will pay perhaps five to five and a half per cent. The opportunity of securing the Brandenburg property for about \$24,000 escaped us. This could yet be secured by condemnation. Shall we, therefore, become alarmed and now hastily buy another residence property not so desirable for much larger sum and for a price not likely to advance much for some time to come? Might it not be well for the people to have other sites and at less prices for consideration? Possibly the board can secure additional ground adjacent to Central school for reasonable price? Would an inexpensive fence along Main street help to avoid objection to the present location? Is the title to Central school site in such shape that it could be abandoned for school purposes without reverting to the grantor? Is a new school site necessary at this time in view of our present undertakings?
