COUNCIL PASSES BOND ORDINANCE ON FIRST READING

SPITZER-RORICK DESIRE TO CLOSE SOON AS POSSIBLE

Fire Marshal and Fire Chief Ordinances Adopted by Council—Petition Presented for Locating Oil Tanks and Buildings by Union Oil Company Referred to Fire Committee—Property Owners Remonstrated—Mayor Makes Appointment

The first step to be taken by the city council in connection with the sale of the railroad bonds to Spitzer-Rorick Bonding company of Toledo, Ohio, was taken last night when a city ordinance provided by Spitzer-Rorick, and said by them to comply with the necessary conditions, was introduced and passed first reading by the council. It provides for the issuance of negotiable warrants by the city for the \$300,000 bond issue.

The ordinance was passed to its second reading without a dissenting vote.

Accompanying the ordinance provided by Spitzer-Rorick company was a letter which outlined the method of procedure in the presenting and passing of the proper ordinances for the bond issue.

The letter also said that if there are no changes made which might cause delay the company will, and hopes to, close up the bond sale deal as rapidly as is possible under the law. The ordinance provides for six warrants for \$50,000 each.

The two ordinances drawn up to cut the city's fire insurance rates and giving the fire chief power to investigate and report conditions he finds in and about buildings in the city were adopted last night by the council. The fire hazard ordinance prohibits the leaving of trash and refuse about buildings to such an extent that they constitute a menace, and also the placing of combustible matter in combustible receptacles about a building in such manner as to constitute a hazard. The fire chief ordinance makes compulsory that the fire chief report to the council such conditions as he thinks are dangerous, which body is empowered to see that the offender is punished if he has been ordered to clean up and has not done so, within a specified time.

A petition for a building permit was presented by O. Payton for the Union Oil company to erect on lots 13 and 14, block 17, Second Railroad Addition, a warehouse, barn and three steel storage tanks. The petition was referred to the fire committee until the next regular meeting.

Following the petition a communication was read from the Underwriters' firm in Portland, advising against the location of oil tanks and a station at that point, owing to the increase it will make in the fire insurance rates of the adjoining property owners.

A remonstrance was read and filed by the following property owners in that vicinity against the location of such a plant at that point, it being signed by the following:

J. C. Rutledge, Swift & Company, Klamath Iron Works, Ewauna Box factory and Martin Bros.

A petition for a building permit was presented the council by D. K. McDonald to erect a one story garage, 11x16 feet, on lot 3, block 68, Nichols addition.

Fire Chief Ambrose reported that one still alarm was answered by the department during February, and that there was no loss or expense during the month.

A sidewalk ordinance presented was referred to the street committee for investigation before being acted upon by the council.

Mayor Crisler made the following appointments to the personnel of the fire department, making nineteen members in all: W. C. Wells, Morris Leslie, Roscoe Bean, Oswald Melmer and J. W. Fringle.
