JAPAN ORDERED CHINA TO JOIN

NEW YORK PAPER STATED THAT JAPAN PRESENTED CHINESE GOVERNMENT WITH ULTIMATUM THAT THEY JOIN ALLIES

NEW YORK, March 7.—According to today's issue of the New York Tribune, Japan presented China with an ultimatum on February 19th, demanding that she join allied forces in the European war.

This is held to account, perhaps, for China's recent declaration of war against Germany.

NEW YORK, March 7.—Advice from Rio Janeiro and London indicates that the royal mail packet liner Drina of 11,553 tons, with passengers and cargo from Rio Janeiro, has been sunk between Lisbon and Liverpool and passengers rescued and landed.

Reports Say Villa Dead

EL PASO, Tex., March 7.—One faction of the Villa Junta is authority for the statement that Villa has died from pneumonia in the mountains near San Andres. The other faction says this report is given out to cover Villa's movements, and it is added that Villa is so short of ammunition he is unable to carry on an offensive. For the same reason Carranza troops in the north are said also to have abandoned the offensive.

Bill Grants Pensions

WASHINGTON, D.
