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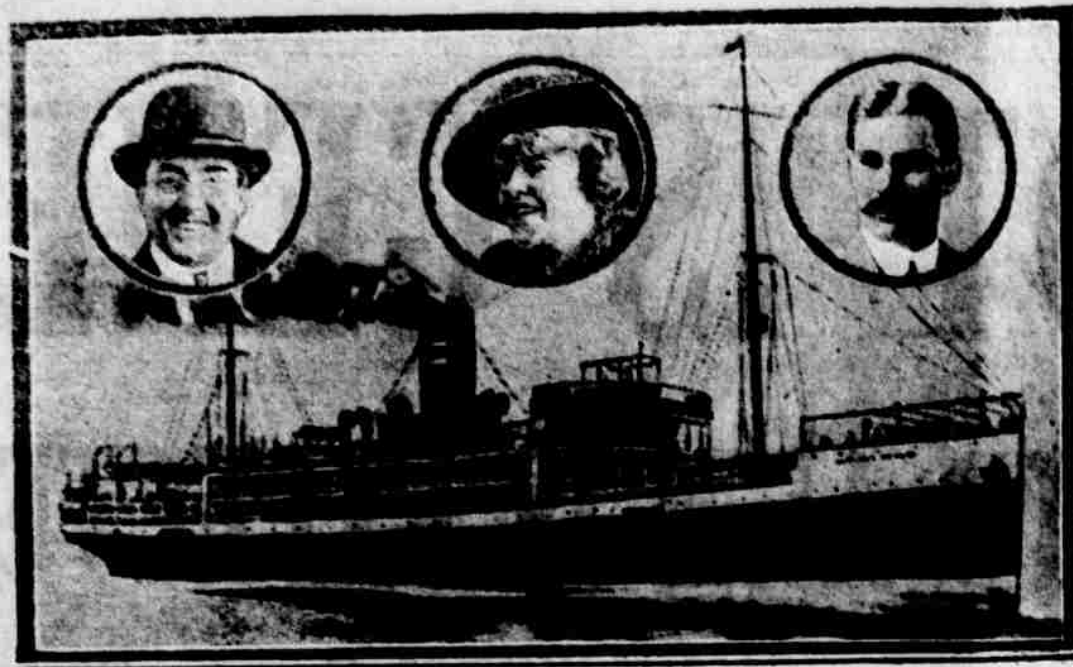

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Spanish Ship Bringing American Embassy from Europe

The Spanish ship Infanta Isabel is bringing former Ambassador Gerard and Mrs. Gerard along with other members of the embassy, including Joseph C. Grew, counselor, back from Europe. The ship is not conveyed by an American warship. She will dock at Havana about March 9, and the Americans will sail north from there.

English Children Are Wearing Wooden Shoes

Shortage of Leather Causes English to Adopt "Clogs" and Looks Probable Business Men Will Do Same

LONDON, Feb. 20.—(By mail)—England, faced with an acute leather shortage, is adopting wooden shoes, commonly known in the Netherlands as clogs. This situation, which before the war would have been hooted by John Bull, today is faced calmly. Measures have been taken looking toward the development of the already established business of making clogs.

To quote the Textile Mercury of Manchester on the subject: Hundreds of London school children are now wearing clogs, which cost about three

shilling a pair (73 cents), and London county council school teachers have been providing clogs for ill-shod pupils, who have been paying for them by weekly installments of three pence.

The price of leather, states a writer in the paper mentioned, suggests that the city man of the future will clatter to business in his clogs. "For country wear one can buy an elegant pair of lace-up clogs at a quarter the price of equally efficient boots." Apart from the attention that they would attract, there is no reason why these should not be worn in town.

MRS. SANGER OUT OF PRISON TODAY

SAYS SHE HAS LEARNED MUCH ABOUT PRISONS FOR HER FUTURE WRITINGS AND DID NOT BREAK ANY RULES.

NEW YORK, March 8.—Having served the thirty days to which she was sentenced for disseminating birth control information in New York city, Mrs. Margaret Sanger, national leader of the birth control movement, was released today. Mrs. Sanger, unlike her sister, Mrs. Ethel Byrne, did not hunger strike in the prison at Blackwell's Island. She served her time quietly, and made the best of her opportunity to study prison conditions. "I have gathered a great deal of material which I shall use in my future writings," said Mrs. Sanger today, "but I did not break any of the prison rules nor attempt to do anything out of the ordinary that would make me trouble."

Plumbers Have Inaug. SACRAMENTO, March 8.—A bill providing for the examination and certification of plumbers was passed in the 1915 session of the legislature but was vetoed by Governor Johnson because it created an expensive commission to carry out the provisions. In this session Assemblyman Phillips has introduced the same kind of a bill but it provides only for a single person to attend to its administration. The bill has passed the assembly.

Two New Districts SACRAMENTO, March 8.—Constitutional amendment is introduced in the legislature to provide for two additional district courts of appeal in California. The present courts are at San Francisco, Los Angeles and Sacramento.

POTATOES AND ONIONS DISPLAYED

NOW CONSIDERED FEATURES FOR UP TO DATE AND CLASSY HABERDASHERY EXHIBITS ALONG WITH FANCY SHIRTS

LOS ANGELES, March 8.—The potato and onion have taken their places as suitable features for window displays. A haberdasher in Whittier has an exhibit in his show window which includes a potato, an onion and a fifty silk shirt.

A neatly written sign in the window announced "Your choice for 11." A sign hangs in a Hill street lunch window which reads "Will you exchange for Ford auto."

Still another inscription, which is on display in the window of a Hill street cafeteria, says: "We'll consider it a favor if the patrons will not order potatoes."

Moving Pictures

In "The Devil's Needle," Triangle drama to be seen at the Star tonight, Norma Talmadge and Tully Marshall are co-starred, and the latter is seen in the kind of part in which he achieved his greatest fame on the speaking stage—that of a morphia fiend. It was in Clyde Fitch's last play, "The City," produced on Broadway several months after his death, that Marshall appeared as a victim of the "devil's needle," and gave such a marvelous impersonation that on the opening night several women fainted and had to be carried from the audience. His individual work was more largely responsible for the success of "The City" than any other one feature of the play.

AMERICAN HELD IN TOKIO PRISON

ENTERED FORTIFIED ZONE CONTRARY TO ORDERS AFTER EXPLOSION AND ABOUT TIME OF OTHER EXPLOSIONS

TOKIO, March 8.—The case of Ralph Hoyt Thayer is attracting considerable attention in Japan. He has been imprisoned in the Yokohama jail undergoing secret examination at the hands of a preliminary magistrate. The judicial authorities refuse to make any statement concerning the affair except to say that Thayer was arrested at Yokohama three nights after the explosion of the battleship cruiser Tsukuba at that port, and he was at once taken into custody for entering a fortified zone without authority. Thayer was a teacher of English in St. Paul's Episcopal college at Tokio, an institution conducted by the American Episcopal mission.

The Episcopal mission has appointed a commission to look after the interests of Thayer. His friends express the opinion that he was interested in the education and conversion of Japanese sailors, and that he visited Yokohama merely to inquire whether any of his acquaintances had been killed in the explosion.

OREGON OFFICERS GET INSTRUCTIONS

PREPARATIONS BEING MADE FOR GENERAL MOBILIZATION IS SHOWN BY CONFIDENTIAL ORDERS RECEIVED

PORTLAND, March 8.—Senior officers of the Oregon national guard, the coast artillery corps and the naval militia have received confidential instructions to prepare for early mobilization, according to information coming from authoritative source.

These instructions are always the forerunners of the general mobilization orders, and the importance of the international situation is indicated by the orders affecting the coast artillery corps, of which there are twelve companies in Oregon. This organization's units are generally held in reserve when the national guard and the naval militia is called.

Adjutant General White will neither affirm nor deny the information, but said that he might have something to say later.

The official confidential instructions from the war department has convinced those in touch with the situation that it is a matter of a very short time before the guard, the naval militia and the corps are called out. The officers who have received the instructions are not only closing their personal affairs as rapidly as possible, but they have also started picking up the hundreds of details which come with the mobilization of any military or naval unit.
