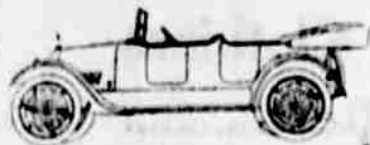

Sugar Beets Would Save Idaho Horses

Provide Winter Feed When Long Winter Runs Price of Hay Out of Sight, Gives Labor in Slack Period

The Malad, Idaho, Enterprise, in commenting on the benefits of the proposed sugar factory for that place, sets forth a few arguments of interest to the citizens of several Western states now entering the field of beet sugar production. It says in part: "Such a factory will afford a fixed market for about one-fourth of the total farm products of the entire valley. But this is only a small portion of the benefits to be derived, in fact, it is only the smallest portion, because if the farmers don't raise beets they will devote their land and energies to some other crop that will give them some returns."

"Aside from the direct interests of the farmers, many benefits are derived from a sugar factory. It would employ 400 or 500 men from October until February, turning the unproductive time of 500 men into productive time, and at the low estimate of \$50 per month it would mean an increase of wealth to the extent of \$25,000 a month."

"A sugar factory in operation this year would have saved thousands of dollars worth of livestock to the valley. Reports received from the winter range that many horses are dying of starvation and exposure. These horses were all shipped because of the lack of feed, and besides hundreds of head of horn stock were shipped, were either sold outright at a ridiculously low price, or moved to other localities for feeding. All of them could have

been kept at home if we had a sugar factory here. "The syrup from a sugar factory would insure the success of an alfalfa meal mill in the valley, and this would afford a ready market for all the alfalfa we could raise. "It has been suggested that we might build a sugar factory here without the aid of outside capital. So much the better if we can, is our idea, but by all means, it is urgent that the farmers and business men boost for this institution if they feel that it will benefit them."

KOLB KNOWN IN MEXICO FORMERLY

MEXICO CITY, March 8.—Inquiry concerning F. Kolb, whose arrest in Hoboken, N. J., following the finding of bombs and explosives in his room, revealed that a man of that name arrived in Vera Cruz in 1914, when the constitutionalist army, headed by General Carranza made its headquarters there.

According to General Juan Merigo, who commanded an artillery corps of the constitutionalist army, Kolb bore a passport signed by Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador in Washington. He said he was a German reservist, and had recently been in South America. General Merigo says the man said he was a machine gun operator, and tried to join his corps, but this permission was refused. Later, the man came to Mexico City and tried again to join the army, but without success. General Merigo says he believes Kolb then went north, probably to the Tampico oil fields. As described by General Merigo, the Kolb known here was tall and slight of build, and comparatively young.

Number of Changes Made in Game Laws

Matter of Dogs Taken Up by Legislature, Migratory Birds Are Affected, And Other Changes Are Made

The following changes in the game laws of Oregon made at the last session of the legislature and particularly applying to Klamath county, have been received by Henry Stout, deputy game warden, from Carl D. Shumaker, state game warden:

The first change is with reference to the law in regard to using dogs for the purpose of chasing or bounding deer. The 1915 law was repealed and the following substituted therefor:

"No person or persons shall make use of a dog in hunting, pursuing or killing any of the game animals of the state of Oregon."

"Any free running dog or dogs running at large in territory inhabited by deer or found following upon the track of any game animal of the state, or any free running dog or dogs running at large in any of the fields of the state after the owner has been duly notified in writing by any game warden or other officer entrusted with the enforcement of the game laws of this state, and if the reputed owner disclaims ownership of the said dog or dogs, the same may be declared a public nuisance and may be killed at such time by any game warden or other person entrusted with the enforcement of the game laws without criminal or civil liability."

"Both men and women are compelled to take out a hunting license under the new game code, although women are exempt from purchasing a fish license. The price of a hunting license is \$1.50, instead of \$1, and the same is true for an angling license."

"The open season all over the state on migratory birds hereafter will be from October 1st to January 15th."

"The Chinese pheasant hen has been protected, and it is unlawful to kill the same at any time hereafter."

"In Game District No. 2 the open season on deer begins September 1st and continues through until October 1st. The bag limit is two, instead of three. However, in Klamath county the open season is from August 15th to October 15th, with a bag limit of two."

"In Game District No. 2 (Klamath county) the open season on sage hens begins August 1st, instead of July 15th, and continues until August 31st."

"The bag limit on trout has been changed through from 75 to 50 trout, or 35 pounds in any one day."

"In Game District No. 2 (Klamath County) winter fishing has been eliminated except for trout over eighteen inches in length."

"Game breeders permits will hereafter cost the sum of \$2, instead of being issued free as heretofore."

COAST TONG WAR IN FULL SWING

OFFER OF PEACE SOCIETY HAVE NO EFFECT UNTIL HOP SINGS HAVE EVENED SCORE WITH HING KONG

SAN FRANCISCO, March 8.—Offers of the Chinese peace society to arrange a peace parley have been scorned by the Chinese tong that started a war Monday with the killing of Chinese in four coast cities. The offers were made following a meeting in the Chinese quarter, in which twenty Chinese pacifists participated.

Representatives of the six warring tongs were invited to attend the meeting, but none of the invitations was accepted. The secretary of the peace society said that he was afraid peace proposals would receive no consideration until the Suey Sings and Hop Sings had at least made an attempt to even the score with the Bing Kongs, who shot members of both these tongs on Monday.

Special details of policemen guarded the depots and ferry landings here and all incoming and outgoing Chinese were searched for weapons. Extra police were on duty in the Chinese quarter.

New Horses in State

SACRAMENTO, March 8.—Warring nations having almost stripped California of horses, there is unprecedented activity toward replenishing the supply. Secretary C. W. Paine of the State Stallion Registration board reported to the legislature. Applications for registration of stallions are coming in at the rate of twenty-five a day, Paine says.

MEMBER NATIONAL GUARD SENT DATA

PRIVATE SCHARFENBERG OF A MINNESOTA COMPANY WROTE TO GERMANY FROM MEXICAN BORDER MANY READY TO RISE

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 8.—Officers of the First Minnesota Infantry returning to Fort Snelling from the Mexican border, announced that Paul L. Scharfenberg of St. Paul, a private in Company L, First Minnesota Infantry, was sentenced to five years imprisonment at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., February 5th, by a court martial of regular army officers sitting at San Antonio, for furnishing military information to Germany.

A letter addressed to relatives in Germany asserting that 10,000,000 Germans in this country were ready to rise up against the government in the event of war with Germany, was intercepted by British authorities and turned over to Washington officials, according to statements by the officers. Scharfenberg is a native of Germany.
