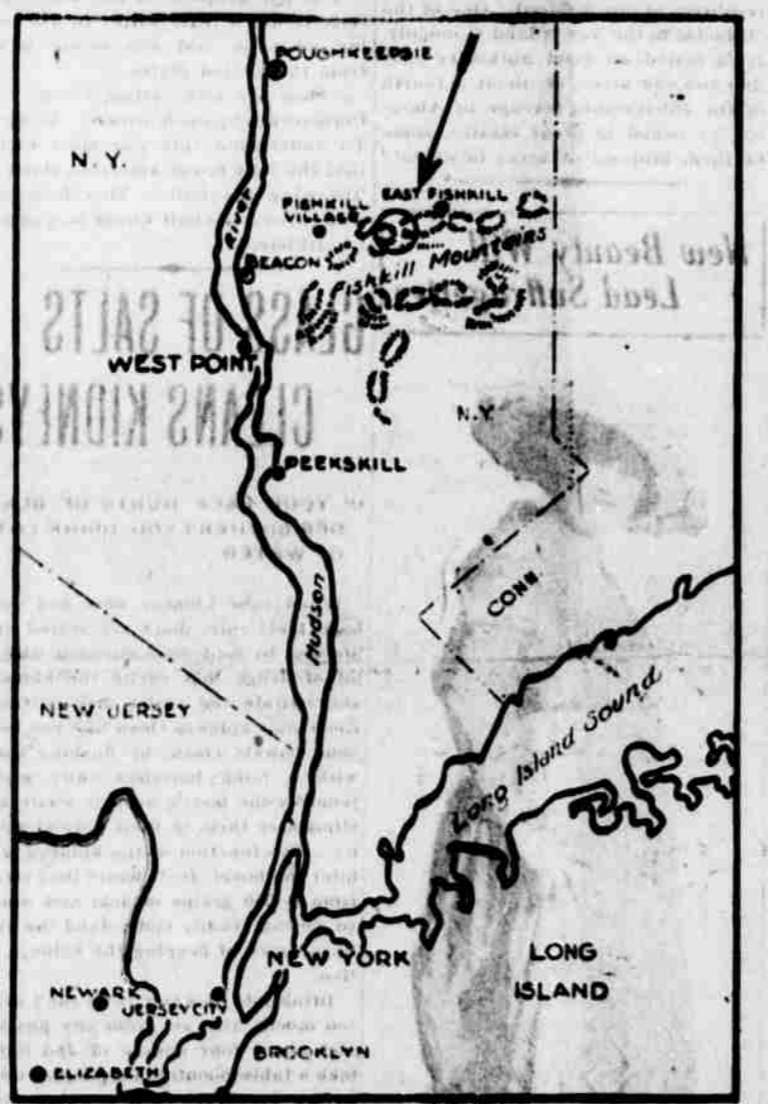

STRIKE MEANS THOUSANDS LOSS TO KLAMATH CO.

STOCK AND SHEEP AT MERCY OF WEATHER

Box Factories Now Running with Barely Enough Cows to Get Along. Strike Would Probably Close Them. Lumbering Industries Getting into Shape to Start as Soon as Weather Relaxes, Already Several Weeks Late, Would Be Hampered.

A railroad strike now would undoubtedly mean the loss of thousands of dollars to Klamath Falls and Klamath county, owing to the acute feed situation here, and also in connection with the large lumbering industries in this vicinity.

Reports from various parts of the county indicate that the loss of feed stock is very serious in Southern and Eastern Oregon.

Shorn and stockmen are moving their herds from their locations now to places where they can secure feed, some are selling, while continued reports of some stock dying continue to reach the city.

O. T. McKendree, who has recently returned from a trip into Nevada and California, and has been in touch with points in this county and Lake, says that unless something happens within a week or so to ease up, large losses will undoubtedly result from lack of feed.

The tying up of the railroads will shut off a supply of feed from the outside which is coming in, and for which orders have been sent, and should the snow and cold weather continue a strike would practically shut off all avenues of escape for many stockmen.

On the other hand, the box factories here operating have had barely enough cars to keep them running one shift. Orders for shipments out have been made recently subject to the coming opening of the lumber industry in this section, already delayed by several weeks owing to ice and snow, will be greatly hampered, if not entirely shut off by a nationwide strike, lumbermen say, meaning a loss of thousands of dollars to this county alone.

GREECE-TURKEY SITUATION WEAK

REPORTS OF ABDICATION OF THE CEASAR CONFLICT

Bonar Law Reads an Official Telegram That the Caesar Has Not Abdicated, Although Arrangements Made—Also Says His Whereabouts Not Known. Petrograd Dispatch Says Abdication Accomplished in Favor of the

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 16.—Official dispatches received by the government indicate that heavier pressure is to be brought on Greece by the entente allies, and it is considered possible that the removal of King Constantine will follow the Russian revolution.

The collapse of Turkey and the complete ejection of this government is imminent.

LONDON, March 16.—Bonar Law read an official telegram in the house of commons today from Petrograd which said that the Caesar has not abdicated, although all arrangements for his abdication have been made.

PETROGRAD, March 16.—The Caesar Nicholas has abdicated the Russian throne in favor of his son, Alexis Nicholasievich. Grand Duke Michael has been named regent.

PETROGRAD, March 16.—Fifteen assembly meetings of the nobility have adopted resolutions supporting the revolution.

Kerensky has been chosen for the new minister of justice, and has decided on the general amnesty of the political offenders. Professor Piotr Mikuloff, the new foreign minister, declared for the necessity of the revolution for the re-establishment of a power capable of achieving victory.

The fate of the former members of the ministry is doubtful. One dispatch says a majority of them have been released and that Protopopoff has been detained.

The Caesar Nicholas is at Pskoff and the empress at Tsarko Solo. The revolutionists are not detaining her.

STOCKHOLM, March 16.—Dispatches detailing the fighting which occurred on Monday have been received here from Petrograd.

It is reported that twenty persons were killed and 120 wounded, and that the railroad to Finland has been blown up.

The assassination of Premier Starmer and Minister of the Interior Protopopoff is rumored, but is discredited here.
