MUCH SNOW IN BLY REGION YET, AND SPRING THAW EXPECTED TO MAKE STAGING BAD, ON ACCOUNT OF ROAD CONDITION

(Klamath County Special Service) BONANZA, March 19.—Earl Hamaker of the firm of Hamaker Brothers, mail contractors, went to Bly Saturday to procure hay to feed the stage stock on that end of the line.

Luke Walker told him to look the situation over, as it would take two weeks of "raining boiling water" to remove the snow in the Bly country. A big flood is expected when the break-up comes there, and no doubt the mail will be delayed then, as it will be impossible to make the trip without much difficulty.

The condition of the road, the absence of bridges and work on the roads will make it almost impossible to make the trip with the volume of water there will be running off at that time.
