BREAKS LAUNCH PROPELLER ON ICE

10,000 PUPILS BEHIND YEARLY

BACKWARD STUDENTS COST THE
STATE \$200,000 ANNUALLY.
PHYSICAL CONDITION LARGE-
LY BLAMED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene,
March 27.—More than 10,000
school children are one or more
grades behind the standard for their
age, according to figures given out in
a recent extension lecture by Dr. H.
W. DeBuck, professor of education in
the University, and this backward
army, he estimates, is costing the
state \$200,000 a year in added ex-
pense of maintaining schools.

Oregon is about average in this re-
spect, Dr. DeBuck believes. About 35
children in every 100 in the United
States, statistics show, are one or
more grades behind, while half of the
20,000,000 of school children are
handicapped in some way by physical
defect.

Of the thirty-five backward ones,
twenty are merely cases of slow devel-
opment, but fifteen fall in studies be-
cause of some preventable physical
trouble.

Defective teeth rank first as causes
of backwardness in children, accord-
ing to figures of Dr. DeBuck, who es-
timates that 50 to 90 per cent of all
school children have dental defects.
An additional 10 per cent are afflicted
with adenoids or diseased tonsils;
20 per cent have defective vision, and
5 per cent suffer from bad hearing.
Trouble with teeth is attributed large-
ly, so far as Oregon is concerned, to
lack of time—a deficiency which also
affects plant organisms seriously in
some sections of the state. Decayed
teeth, producing poisonous pus, often
result in physical disaster.

First grade students in the state
show about 12 1/2 per cent of failures.
The percentage decreases up to the
sixth grade, then the failure curve as-
cends through the seventh, after
which the survivors show an increas-
ing ratio of mental capacity.
