# FIRST TO ARRIVE FROM CALIFORNIA

Z. W. GORE, REPRESENTATIVE OF COAST TOUR BOOK, MAKES TRIP BY MACHINE FROM SAN FRANCISCO FINDING ROADS IN IMPASSABLE SHAPE

Z. W. Gore, representative of the Pacific Tour Book, driving a model 490 Chevrolet roadster, is credited with being the first to make the trip this year from San Francisco to this city by automobile.

He made the trip by way of the Sacramento canyon, Ager, Topay, grade, Dorris and Merrill, arriving here Saturday afternoon. He spent four days coming from Ager. Parts of the road were impassable and he was forced to drive through the rocks and over rocky hillsides often.

Mr. Gore averaged 33 miles per gallon of gasoline and used three and a half quarts of lubricating oil on the 505 mile trip, he said. He will be here several days.

## GERMANY'S FOOD OVER-ESTIMATED

AMSTERDAM, March 28.—Advices received here say that Batocki, the government's official food manager in Germany, has admitted before a reichstag committee that the food supply in Germany has been over-estimated and the lack of labor and transportation facilities are preventing increased production.

BERLIN, March 28.—The Cologne Gazette hints that Bethmann von Hollweg may grant electoral reforms in Germany, increasing the scope of a democracy movement, before the war ends.
